Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:
Section 1. Section 20A-14-104 is amended to read:
20A-14-104. Becoming a candidate for membership on the State Board of
Education Nominating and recruiting committee Membership Procedure Duties.
(1) (a) Persons interested in becoming a candidate for the State Board of Education
shall file a declaration of candidacy according to the procedures and requirements of Sections
20A-9-201 and 20A-9-202.
(b) By May 1 of the year in which a State Board of Education member's term expires,
the lieutenant governor shall submit the name of each person who has filed a declaration of
candidacy for the State Board of Education to the nominating and recruiting committee for the
State Board of Education.
(2) [By November] On or before March 1 of [the year preceding each] a regular general
election year, the governor shall appoint a nominating and recruiting committee consisting of
12 members, each to serve a two-year term, [shall be appointed by the governor] as follows:
(a) one member shall be appointed to represent each of the following business and
industry sectors:
(i) manufacturing and mining;
(ii) transportation and public utilities;
(iii) service, trade, and information technology;
(iv) finance, insurance, and real estate;
(v) construction; and
(vi) agriculture; and
(b) one member shall be appointed to represent each of the following education
sectors:
(i) teachers;
(ii) school administrators;
(iii) parents;

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57	(iv) local school board members;
58	(v) charter schools; and
59	(vi) higher education.
60	(3) In appointing members of the nominating and recruiting committee, the governor:
61	(a) [The members appointed under Subsections (2)(a)(i) through (vi) and (2)(b)(i)

69	philosophies, viewpoints, or affiliations of an individual whose name is submitted under
70	Subsection (3)(a).
71	(4) (a) The members shall elect one member to serve as chair for the committee.
72	(b) The chair, or another member of the committee designated by the chair, shall
73	schedule and convene all committee meetings.
74	(c) Any formal action by the committee requires the approval of a majority of
75	committee members.
76	(d) Members of the nominating and recruiting committee shall serve without
77	compensation, but [they] may be reimbursed for expenses incurred in the performance of their
78	official duties as established by the Division of Finance.
79	(5) The nominating and recruiting committee shall:
80	(a) recruit potential candidates for membership on the State Board of Education prior
81	to the deadline to file a declaration of candidacy;
82	(b) interview each individual who files a declaration of candidacy for the office of
83	State Board of Education member;
84	[(b)] (c) prepare a list of candidates for membership on the State Board of Education
85	for each state board district subject to election in that year using the qualifications under
86	Subsection (6);
87	[(c)] (d) submit a list of at least three candidates for each state board position to the

88	governor [by July] on or before April 1; and
89	[(d)] (e) ensure that the list includes appropriate background information on each
90	candidate.
91	[(6) The nominating committee shall select a broad variety of candidates who possess
92	outstanding professional qualifications relating to the powers and duties of the State Board of
93	Education, including experience in the following areas:
94	[(a) business and industry administration;]
95	[(b) business and industry human resource management;]
96	[(c) business and industry finance;]
97	[(d) business and industry, including expertise in:]
98	[(i) metrics and evaluation;]
99	[ <del>(ii) manufacturing;</del> ]
100	[ <del>(iii) retailing;</del> ]
101	[(iv) natural resources;]
102	[(v) information technology;]
103	[ <del>(vi) construction;</del> ]
104	[ <del>(vii) banking;</del> ]

114	(6) The nominating committee shall select the most qualified of the candidates, taking
115	into account a candidate's:
116	(a) level and quality of experience, including experience in the following areas:
117	(i) education;
118	(ii) administration or management;

120	(A) a local school board or a charter school governing board, or in a state education
121	agency; and
122	(B) other boards of public, private, for-profit, or nonprofit entities;
123	(iv) finances; and
124	(v) business management;
125	(b) knowledge and understanding of skill sets needed by Utah's citizens, including
126	<u>Utah's future workforce;</u>
127	(c) work ethic;
128	(d) financial responsibility;
129	(e) ability to perform the responsibilities of a member of the State Board of Education;

131	(f) commitment to the policies of Utah's public education system described in Section
132	<u>53A-1-101.</u>
133	(7) The nominating and recruiting committee:
134	(a) may not consider, nor make a selection, based on the political or educational
135	philosophies, viewpoints, or affiliations of an individual who files a declaration of candidacy
136	for the office of State Board of Education member; and
137	(b) shall, with the list described in Subsection (5)(c), submit a written statement to the
138	governor describing the qualifications of the candidates on the list.

140	20A-14-105. Becoming a candidate for membership on the State Board of
141	Education Selection of candidates by the governor Ballot placement.
142	(1) [By] On or before August 1 of each regular general election year, the governor
143	shall:
144	(a) for each state board district subject to election in that year, select two candidates for
145	the State Board of Education from the lists submitted by the state board district nominating and
146	recruiting committee; and
147	(b) certify the names of the two candidates from each school board district to the
148	lieutenant governor.
149	(2) In selecting the candidates under Subsection (1)(a), the governor:

150	(a) shall select the most qualified of the candidates, taking into account the criteria
151	described in Subsection 20A-14-104(6);
152	(b) may not consider, nor make a selection, based on the political or educational
153	philosophies, viewpoints, or affiliations of a candidate; and
154	(c) shall, with the certification described in Subsection (1)(b), provide a written
155	statement to the lieutenant governor describing the qualifications of the candidates selected by
156	the governor.
157	[(2)] (3) If the governor fails to select two candidates for a state board district by
158	August 1, the nominating and recruiting committee shall:
159	(a) select the two candidates[; and] using the same criteria, and subject to the same
160	limitations, described in Subsections (2)(a) and (b);
161	(b) notify the lieutenant governor of [its] the committee's selections [by] on or before
162	August 31[:]; and
163	(c) with the notification described in Subsection (3)(b), submit a written statement to
164	the lieutenant governor describing the qualifications of the candidates selected by the
165	nominating and recruiting committee.
166	[(3)] (4) In accordance with Section 20A-6-305, the lieutenant governor shall certify
167	the names described in Subsection (1)(b) or (3)(b), as applicable, and the order of the names, to
168	the county clerks for placement on the nonpartisan section of the ballot.

180	Section 4. Effective date.

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181	If approved by two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, this bill takes effect
182	upon approval by the governor, or the day following the constitutional time limit of Utah
183	Constitution, Article VII, Section 8, without the governor's signature, or in the case of a veto,
184	the date of veto override.
