39	26-21a-203. Department rulemaking authority.		
40	The department shall make rules under Title 63G, Chapter 3, Utah Administrative		
41	Rulemaking Act:		
42	(1) establishing quality assurance standards for all facilities performing screening or		
43	diagnostic mammography and developing mammogram x-ray films, including notification and		
44	procedures for clinical follow-up of abnormal mammograms;		
45	(2) providing for:		
46	(a) collection and periodic reporting of mammography examinations and clinical		
47	follow-up data to the department;		
48	(b) certification and revocation of certification of mammogram facilities;		
49	(c) inspection of mammogram facilities, including entry of agents of the department		
50	into the facilities for inspections;		
51	(d) setting fees for certification; and		
52	(e) an appeal process regarding department certification decisions; and		
53	[(3) the following information may be included in mammography results sent to a		
54	patient with dense breast tissue:]		
55	["Mammography is the only breast cancer screening examination which has been		

56	shown in multiple randomized clinical trials to reduce death rate from breast cancer. However,
57	it is not a perfect test, specifically in women with dense breast tissue. Because your
58	mammogram demonstrates that you have dense breast tissue, you may benefit from
59	supplementary screening tests, depending on your personal risk factors and family history.
60	Although other screening tests may find additional cancers, they may not necessarily increase
61	survival. Nevertheless, you should discuss your mammography results with your health care
62	provider. A copy of your mammography report has been sent to your health care provider's
63	office. Please contact your health care provider if you have any questions or concerns about
64	this notice."]

79	(1) As used in this section, "dense breast tissue" means heterogeneously dense tissue or
30	extremely dense tissue as defined in the Breast Imaging and Reporting Data System established
31	by the American College of Radiology.
32	(2) A facility that is certified under Section 26-21a-204 shall include the following
33	notification and information with a mammography result provided to a patient with dense
34	breast tissue:
35	"Your mammogram indicates that you have dense breast tissue. Dense breast tissue is
36	common and is found in as many as half of all women. However, dense breast tissue can make

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87	it more difficult to fully and accurately evaluate your mammogram and detect early signs of
88	possible cancer in the breast. This information is being provided to inform and encourage you
89	to discuss your dense breast tissue and other breast cancer risk factors with your health care
90	provider. Together, you can decide what may be best for you. A copy of your mammography
91	report has been sent to your health care provider. Please contact them if you have any questions
92	or concerns about this notice."
