8	General Description:
9	This bill repeals and enacts provisions related to school-based mental health support.
10	Highlighted Provisions:
11	This bill:
12	 defines terms;
13	 authorizes the State Board of Education (board) to distribute money to local
14	education agencies (LEAs) for personnel who provide school-based mental health
15	support;
16	 requires the board to establish a formula for distribution of money to LEAs;
17	 enacts requirements on LEAs to receive money;
18	 requires the board to make rules related to money for the personnel; and
19	 enacts other provisions related to student mental health support.

21	This bill appropriates in fiscal year 2020:
22	 to the State Board of Education - Minimum School Program - Related to Basic
23	School Programs - Student Health and Counseling Support Program, as an ongoing

33 34	Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:
35	Section 1. Section 53F-2-415 is enacted to read:
36	53F-2-415. Student health and counseling support Qualifying personnel
37	Distribution formula Rulemaking.
38	(1) As used in this section:
39	(a) "Intergenerational poverty" means the same as that term is defined in Section
40	<u>35A-9-102.</u>
41	(b) "Qualifying personnel" means a school counselor or other counselor, school
42	psychologist or other psychologist, school social worker or other social worker, or school nurse
43	who:
44	(i) is licensed; and
45	(ii) collaborates with educators and a student's parent on:
46	(A) early identification and intervention of the student's academic and mental health
47	needs; and
48	(B) removing barriers to learning and developing skills and behaviors critical for the
49	student's academic achievement.
50	(2) (a) Subject to legislative appropriations, and in accordance with Subsection (2)(b),
51	the state board shall distribute money appropriated under this section to LEAs to provide in a
52	school targeted school-based mental health support, including trauma-informed care, through
53	employing or entering into contracts for services provided by qualifying personnel.
54	(b) (i) The state board shall, after consulting with LEA governing boards, develop a
55	formula to distribute money appropriated under this section to LEAs.
56	(ii) The formula shall take into consideration:
57	(A) LEAs with one or more schools with a high percentage of students who have
58	experienced a risk factor for childhood trauma;

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59	(B) LEAs with one or more schools with a high percentage of students experiencing
60	intergenerational poverty; and
61	(C) LEAs with one or more elementary schools with a low percentage of qualifying
62	personnel.
63	(3) To qualify for money under this section, an LEA shall submit to the state board an
64	application that includes:
65	(a) measurable goals on improving student safety, student engagement, school culture,
66	and academic achievement;
67	(b) how the LEA intends to meet the goals described in Subsection (3)(a) through the
68	use of the money; and
69	(c) how the LEA is meeting the requirements related to parent education described in
70	<u>Section 53G-9-703.</u>
71	(4) The state board shall distribute money appropriated under this section to an LEA
72	that qualifies under Subsection (3):
73	(a) based on the formula described in Subsection (2)(b); and
74	(b) in an amount of money that the LEA equally matches using local or unrestricted
75	state money.
76	(5) An LEA may not use money distributed by the state board under this section to
77	supplant federal, state, or local money previously allocated to employ or enter into contracts for
78	services provided by qualified personnel.
79	(6) The state board shall make rules that establish:
80	(a) procedures for applying for and distributing money under this section, including
81	definitions of risk factors for childhood trauma;
82	(b) the formula the state board will use to distribute money to LEAs described in
83	Subsection (2)(b); and
84	(c) in accordance with Subsection (7), annual reporting requirements for an LEA that
85	receives money under this section.
86	(7) An LEA that receives money under this section shall submit an annual report to the
87	state board, including:
88	(a) progress toward achieving the goals submitted under Subsection (3)(a); and
89	(b) if the LEA discontinues a qualifying personnel position, the LEA's reason for

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90	discontinuing the position.
91	(8) Beginning on or before July 1, 2019, the state board shall provide training that
92	instructs school personnel on the impact of childhood trauma on student learning, including
93	information advising educators against practicing medicine, giving a diagnosis, or providing
94	treatment.
95	(9) The state board may use up to 3% of an appropriation under this section for costs
96	related to the administration of the provisions of this section.
97	(10) Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, money appropriated under this
98	section may be used, as determined by the state board, for:
99	(a) the School Safety and Crisis Line described in Section 53E-10-502; or
100	(b) youth suicide prevention programs described in Section 53G-9-702.
