LONG TITLE

General Description:

This bill relates to crisis response treatment and resources.

Highlighted Provisions:

This bill:

- ▶ defines terms;
- ▶ changes the name of the "Mental Health Crisis Line Commission" to the "Mental Health Crisis Response Commission";
- ▶ modifies the membership of the Mental Health Crisis Response Commission;
- ▶ creates a pilot program to fund a mental health receiving center for individuals experiencing a mental health crisis;
- ▶ requires the Department of Human Services to establish a statewide stabilization services plan and standards for providing stabilization services to a child or the child's parent or legal guardian; and
- ▶ makes technical changes.

43 Section 1. Section **26-18-418** is amended to read:

44 **26-18-418. Medicaid waiver for mental health crisis lines and mobile crisis**
45 **outreach teams.**

46 (1) As used in this section:

47 (a) "Local mental health crisis line" means the same as that term is defined in Section
48 **63C-18-102.**

49 (b) "Mental health crisis" means:

50 (i) a mental health condition that manifests itself in an individual by symptoms of
51 sufficient severity that a prudent layperson who possesses an average knowledge of mental
52 health issues could reasonably expect the absence of immediate attention or intervention to
53 result in:

54 (A) serious danger to the individual's health or well-being; or

55 (B) a danger to the health or well-being of others; or

56 (ii) a mental health condition that, in the opinion of a mental health therapist or the

57 therapist's designee, requires direct professional observation or the intervention of a mental
58 health therapist.

59 (c) (i) "Mental health crisis services" means direct mental health services and on-site
60 intervention that a mobile crisis outreach team provides to an individual suffering from a
61 mental health crisis, including the provision of safety and care plans, prolonged mental health
62 services for up to 90 days, and referrals to other community resources.

63 (ii) "Mental health crisis services" includes:

64 (A) local mental health crisis lines; and

65 (B) the statewide mental health crisis line.

201 (1) As used in this section:

202 (a) "Grant" means a grant awarded by the division under this section to a local mental
203 health authority to develop and implement a project.

204 (b) "Mental health receiving center" means a nonsecure program established by a local
205 mental health authority in a county that is responsible for an individual experiencing a mental
206 health crisis.

207 (c) "Project" means a mental health receiving center pilot project for which the division
208 awards a grant.

209 (2) (a) Subject to appropriation, before July 1, 2019, the division shall issue a project
210 proposal request in accordance with this section to award a grant to one or more mental health
211 receiving centers to develop and implement a project.

212 (b) Subject to appropriation, the division shall award all grants under this section
213 before December 31, 2019.

214 (c) A project shall run for two years.

215 (3) The purpose of a project is to determine how a mental health receiving center can
216 be used in this state to:

217 (a) increase access to mental health crisis services for individuals experiencing a
218 mental health crisis; and

219 (b) reduce the number of individuals who are incarcerated while experiencing a mental
220 health crisis.

221 (4) An application for a grant under this section shall:

222 (a) identify the population to which the mental health receiving center will provide
223 mental health crisis services;

224 (b) identify the type of mental health crisis services the mental health receiving center
225 will provide;

226 (c) explain how the population described in Subsection (4)(a) will benefit from the
227 provision of mental health crisis services;

228 (d) provide details regarding:

229 (i) how the mental health receiving center plans to provide mental health crisis
230 services;

231 (ii) how the proposed project will ensure that consideration is given to the capacity and
232 availability of mental health crisis services in the mental health receiving center;

233 (iii) how the mental health receiving center will ensure timely and effective provision
234 of mental health crisis services;

236 (v) the sustainability of the proposed project; and

237 (vi) the methods the proposed project will use to:
