### **MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS**

Former Speaker Gregory H. Hughes administered the Oath of Office to the members of the House of Representatives.

Roll call showed all members present, except Representative Marc Roberts, excused.

On motion of Representative Brian King, the House voted to nominate Brad R. Wilson as Speaker of the House for the 63rd Legislature.

On motion of Representative Francis Gibson, the House voted to elect Brad Wilson, by acclamation, as Speaker of the House for the 63rd Legislature.

Former Speaker Greg Hughes administered the Oath of Office to Speaker-elect Brad R. Wilson.

### **REMARKS BY SPEAKER BRAD R. WILSON**

We owe a tremendous debt of gratitude to my predecessor Speaker Greg Hughes, whose courageous, tenacious, and oftentimes exhausting leadership helped to bring about remarkable outcomes that took the long view.

On a personal note, I am profoundly grateful for Greg's friendship and mentor-ship as I have worked with him over the past several years. He taught me a great deal about leadership and the importance of protecting this institution and its members. I don't believe anyone can fill his shoes or carry out the work of the legislature quite the way he did. I believe I speak for all of us in saying he will be greatly missed.

That said, the two most important lessons I learned from Greg are: First, don't participate in rap videos about our process; and second, we have work to do and the opening day speech shouldn't last an hour.

So, let's thank him one last time for his years of service and then have Highway Patrol escort him out of the building so we can start getting things done.

150 years ago this coming spring, on May 10, 1869, an excited crowd gathered at Promontory Summit in Utah Territory to witness an extraordinary event: the joining of the Central Pacific and Union Pacific Railroads to form the first Transcontinental Railroad. The driving of the final, golden spike had been postponed by two days as a result of inclement weather and a labor dispute, which served only to heighten the anticipation of the crowd in attendance.

As Central Pacific Railroad president Leland Stanford gently tapped the spike into place, telegraph operators flashed the message, "DONE," to cities across the country, sparking celebrations nationwide that included fireworks, parades, and music.

Only one year earlier, however, the massive project had been in peril. In the spring of 1868, Brigham Young sat in his office on the corner of South Temple and State Street, listening thoughtfully to reports of the project's construction.

The Union Pacific Railroad, driving west from Omaha, and the Central Pacific Railroad, driving east from Sacramento, were rapidly approaching the borders of the Utah Territory and were in dire need of workers. Critics were predicting that the leader of the Latter-day Saints would see the railroad as a threat to his people's hard-won solitude and that he would oppose its progress.

I like to imagine that, after hearing the reports, Brigham Young smiled to himself.

He had something else in mind.

Moving decisively, he halted construction on the Salt Lake Temple, now 17 years into what would be a 40-year project, negotiated contracts with both companies, and organized several thousand workers to complete the project.

When significant challenges arose during the project, Brigham Young persevered.

After it became clear the two companies had no intention of honoring their financial obligations, Young personally advanced funds to the workers to keep the project moving.

And when the railroad companies decided to meet North of the Great Salt Lake rather than in Salt Lake City, Young tenaciously held to his vision of the prosperity this new type of transportation would bring to the valley. Instead, he formed his own company and built a line from Ogden to Salt Lake City.

Colonel Carr, a Union Pacific official who saw the effort, observed admiringly, “It has been built solely with money wrung from the soil—by the strong arms of men and women who stand before me.”

The strength, industry, and forward thinking that defined Brigham Young in this effort, can and should define the men and women who fill the seats of this chamber. Directly behind you in the Capitol Rotunda, a painting of Brigham Young is joined by images of other towering figures in our state’s history: Fathers Dominguez and Escalante, Peter Skene Ogden, and John C. Fremont.

These figures remind us that our distinctive past forms the fabric of our present prosperity. And if we are wise, the same principles that guided them will propel us toward a brighter and even more prosperous future.

As was true for the mountaineers, adventurers, and pioneers who shaped the early days of our state, the path to prosperity is discovered in taking the long view. While the executive and the judicial branches of government have their roles, it is the legislature that is charged with looking to the future and planning for tomorrow.

As members of a separate and equal branch of government, our role is to craft forward-looking public policy that ensures our state remains an incomparable place to live, work, and play.

We are enjoying a period of remarkable growth. Since 2009, Utah has had the highest job growth rate of any state in the country. Our unemployment rates have remained well below the national average. And Utah is one of the healthiest states in the nation. Put simply, our economy is diverse and robust, tourism is growing year over year, and business leaders recognize Utah as an outstanding destination both for their companies and for their employees.

Significant growth brings challenges, which loom large both in number and in scope. But I am not worried. The reason I am not is because of all of you. I know each of you, Republicans and Democrats alike. I have seen your unique talents and limitless dedication in action, and I am absolutely certain that you are up to the task and that together we will conquer whatever issues we face.

The Utah House of Representatives has led the way in forging a future that faithfully honors our pioneer heritage. The People's House has unapologetically established Utah as a shining standard to which communities, states, and nations can aspire. In continuing this tradition, the selfless and conscientious service of *every* representative is needed—regardless of your experience, tenure, or political persuasion.

To those of you who are here for the first time, we welcome you and are grateful for your willingness to serve the people of Utah. Your work as a lawmaker will be both demanding and rewarding—and I urge you to rise to the occasion.

We must be responsive to our constituents, work to understand their interests, and strive to represent them faithfully. They have elected us to become educated and informed on the issues we face, and they trust us to make hard decisions.

We are not here to simply occupy a seat, but rather to be informed and courageous in voting for what we believe is right.

Most importantly, we must stay true to the principles that inspired us to engage in public service in the first place. It is our responsibility as elected members of the legislative branch to look to the future and plan not only for tomorrow, but for tomorrow's tomorrow.

Take pride in the fact that you are a member of the House—the arena—where solutions to critical, yet difficult issues are solved, and where our distinctive Utah is preserved and our prosperity is ensured.

The pioneers who settled our valleys were people of character who planted deep in our Rocky Mountain soil not only seeds for crops, but the ideals of industry and self-reliance, compassion and generosity, integrity and civic virtue.

Once commonplace, these values have molded and produced a thoroughly *uncommon* and distinctive Utah.

In turn, it is our distinctive Utah that is producing strong families, businesses, and communities united by a spirit of cooperation and commitment to the common good.

It is our distinctive Utah that causes people of different opinions to come together in good faith to create innovative and compassionate solutions to pressing issues.

And it is our distinctive Utah that we should be proud of and work to protect and preserve.

Despite our high quality of life and recent success, there are threats to our prosperity that we must be prepared for. The obstacles we face today are different than those faced by the pioneers of the past, though no less difficult in their own right.

Rapid growth, presenting both an opportunity and a challenge, demands thoughtful and careful planning in the areas of water, transportation, and air quality, as well as effective management of our pristine public lands. As we face these opportunities head on, our actions must not be held hostage by our fears, but spring from a well of deep conviction.

As we grapple with these issues, we must, and we will, make decisions that at times challenge our previously held opinions. This is what taking the long view requires of us—that we make choices not only for the good of our children, but for the good of our children’s children.

We will tackle issues this session that promise to demand the kind of leadership and fearless decision-making I am referring to. While it would be impossible to mention all of the weighty issues we will face over the next 45 days, I look forward to:

- Improving school safety,
- Aligning our higher education system with the demands of today’s economy,
- And continuing to make smart investments to improve air quality in our state.

I also look forward to:

- Working with Representative Val Potter to improve housing affordability,
- Supporting the efforts of Representative Steve Eliason on suicide prevention,
- And helping Representative Jefferson Moss clarify and enhance the legislature's role in long-term policy planning.

We have the opportunity to take the long view and fix our broken tax structure in a way that positions the state for long-term financial stability and ensures Utah retains its status as an exceptional place for individuals, families, and communities to grow.

In recent years the proliferation of service-based businesses has profoundly changed the nature of our economy. While income tax revenues have been strong, this changing economy has resulted in people spending less on goods and more on services. This change in how we live has put us in a position where we will soon be unable to fund critical government services our constituents across the state depend on every day.

Representatives Quinn and Spendlove are working with our colleagues in the Senate to develop a proposal that will broaden the sales tax base while reducing rates, thereby improving parity across economic sectors. Without this restructuring, Utah's General Fund will be gobbled up, and we will be unable to fund roads, public safety and basic government programs. This work will not be easy, but it must be done.

But the real benefit of fixing our broken tax structure is it will allow us to cut taxes. I've suggested to these two members of the House that a \$200 million tax cut is good. Something great would be to deliver the largest single tax cut in Utah's history, to the tune of at least \$225 million dollars.

In addition to efforts on tax restructuring and other policy areas, I believe it is time to strengthen the ties between the people of Utah and our seat of government. Due to its location, the Capitol Complex isn't particularly accessible. And because I don't want to begin my tenure as Speaker by inciting riots in the gallery, I won't even *think* about articulating how fun it is trying to find parking up here.

That said, I urge Chairman Last and the Executive Appropriations Committee to work with Representative Dunnigan and the Capitol Preservation Board to bring us a proposal that would replace the state office building with a new facility where Utahns can come to experience a deeper connection to our state's rich history—as well as solve the parking problem.

I am grateful for and humbled by the responsibility we share as elected representatives of the people of Utah, and I am excited for the opportunity to serve with you in this great state. It is my hope that, at the conclusion of our service, we will have made healthcare more innovative and affordable; our education systems more nimble and forward-looking; our infrastructure better suited to meet the opportunities of tomorrow; and our unparalleled natural resources preserved for the enjoyment of current and future generations.

Like the men and women before us, we must fix our gaze on the far horizon and push forward in a spirit of cooperation and determination, putting policy always above politics. In so doing, we can preserve our distinctive Utah and produce a quality of life and prosperity to be enjoyed by all citizens of our state for generations to come.

There are also many individuals whose work on our behalf often goes unnoticed. Without them, it wouldn't be possible for us to serve. Our dedicated year-round professional staff, our House staff, our session staff and our interns put in countless hours to make our work successful.

On motion of Representative Mike Schultz, the House voted to authorize Speaker Wilson to appoint a committee to meet with a like committee from the Senate to wait upon the Governor to inform him that the Legislature is organized and ready to receive any communication or message he may have to offer. Speaker Wilson appointed Representatives Paul Ray, Val Potter, and Joel Briscoe.

On motion of Representative Carol Spackman Moss, the House voted to authorize Speaker Wilson to appoint a committee to notify the Senate to inform that Honorable Body that the House is organized and ready to do business. Speaker Wilson appointed Representatives Brad Daw, Doug Sagers, and Andrew Stoddard.

On motion of Representative Tim Hawkes, the House voted, by a two-thirds majority, to adopt House Rules, Joint Rules, and Interim Rules as were adopted by the 2018 Third Special Session of the 62nd Legislature, until such time as new rules may be adopted by the 2019 General Session of the 63rd Legislature.

On motion of Representative Tim Hawkes, and as allowed by the Utah Constitution and the Joint Rules of the Legislature, the House voted, by a two-thirds majority, to continue its practice of reading only the short title of bills and resolutions as they are introduced or considered on a House calendar and not read the long title of the bills and resolutions, unless a majority of the House directs the reading of the long title, short title, or both, of any House or Senate bill or resolution.

On motion of Representative Angela Romero, the House voted to print the elected House Majority Caucus Leadership for the 2019–2020 term upon the pages of the House Journal.

**STATE OF THE JUDICIARY**  
**REMARKS BY CHIEF JUSTICE MATTHEW B. DURRANT**

Speaker Wilson, legislators of the great state of Utah, each year, I look forward to sharing with you my thoughts on the state of Utah's judiciary. I'm joined today by my colleagues: Associate Chief Justice Lee, Justice Himonas, Justice Pearce, and Justice Peterson. Each is a dedicated, thoughtful, and brilliant jurist. I'm also pleased to be joined today by the members of our judicial council. Thank you for welcoming us here today, and thank you for your dedicated service.

I often start my remarks with a story. This year, I'd like to tell you about Walter Arnold. 122 years ago, Mr. Arnold was apprehended by a constable for speeding through Paddock Wood, a village about 40 miles southeast of London. He was operating an Arnold Benz Motor Carriage designed and manufactured by his own company.

I'm sure Mr. Arnold was thrilled to test the limits of his machine. But, as is often the case, the police did not share his enthusiasm. When Mr. Arnold flew past the officer at a blistering rate of four-times the speed limit, the chase was on. Ordinarily, for a vehicle traveling the speed limit at the time, the officer might easily have pursued on foot, at a stroll's pace, because the speed limit was 2 MPH. But in order to apprehend Mr. Arnold, the officer was forced to pursue on a pedal bike. After what I can only imagine was a frenzied and exhausting chase, reaching speeds upwards of 8 MPH, the officer stopped Mr. Arnold. Order and safety were restored to the village roads.

Mr. Arnold was brought to court for his crime, where, upon hearing the case and considering all of the evidence, the judge ordered a one-shilling fine. If my math is correct, this would be roughly \$8.00 in today's money. A suitable punishment for so heinous a crime.

Mr. Arnold's experience serves as a single example of the beginning of an era of legislative and judicial efforts to address a dramatic social metamorphosis, one driven by the technological revolution. To shed some light on just how dramatic these changes were, we can look to the records of motor vehicle registrations. In 1900, only 8,000 motor vehicles were registered in the United States. Just 20 years later, that number had increased to nearly ten million.<sup>1</sup> Those two decades gave birth to an entire system of laws and conventions that each of us continues to observe today. And none of us questions the need for such rules, especially as we speed toward each other on undivided roadways at a combined 130 miles per hour or more, with nothing separating us from a head-on collision but a series of yellow dashes painted on the pavement and a common understanding of their meaning. Mr. Arnold's case and the traffic laws to which he was subject illustrate well the

familiar process of creating, enforcing, and adjudicating the law. For centuries, the law has charted this same course forward, responding along the way to the need for safety, predictability, and uniformity. You don't need me to tell you that this is the task you as the legislature embark upon today.

And while Mr. Arnold's speeding case was simple and straightforward, it demonstrates one of the major challenges for legislatures and courts in every generation: to create and apply the law in a way that fosters public trust and confidence. Over time, legislative and judicial action shapes, and is shaped by, community values, establishing a common commitment to shared conventions.

Widespread adherence to the law results in a more durable social fabric. This is the basis for the rule of law.

For hundreds of years, scholars and authors have wrestled with defining "the rule of law." The term is not mentioned in the United States Constitution. Neither is it mentioned in the Utah Constitution. And it is not explicitly defined in the federal or state codes. Yet the rule of law undergirds every aspect of our state and federal governments. The courts of the United States describe the rule of law as "a principle under which all persons, institutions, and entities are accountable to laws that are publicly promulgated, equally enforced, and independently adjudicated."<sup>2</sup> Public participation in, and respect for, our institutions of government is essential.

Yet, like many of you, I read in the national news of widespread political discontent and of warring factions who seem to be irreconcilably divided by their views. Like you, I have seen how tribalism and isolation have disrupted social cohesion. Cynicism causes many to surrender to indifference. A complaint often voiced is that government and the courts have become "too political." Some believe that politicians do only what's right for their party, not for the people. Others believe that judges allow politics to influence their interpretation of the law. Very few are insulated from or unaware of these trends.

Let me say clearly—fidelity to the law should never be shaped by or subjugated to a political agenda. Sadly, this is not a universally respected principle. Some seem to forget, or willfully ignore, that the rule of law is a bedrock principle upon which our country and our state have been established. And just as the rule of law has been essential to our strength as a country, when it is undermined, it weakens us immeasurably. At its extreme, undermining the rule of law jeopardizes the health of our democratic republic.

Thankfully, I think these conflicts run more deeply in print and on screens of all sizes than they do in the hearts and minds of the people. The vast majority of

Americans are law-abiding citizens who honor the law of the land in their day-to-day lives. And they expect that same commitment from their political representatives and judges. As those who have been elected or appointed to positions of power and influence, it's imperative, now more than ever before, that we meet this expectation and adhere faithfully to the rule of law.

No one is above the law, and no one should be beneath its protections. It is the rule of law that provides accountability and security. There are many ways you can measure a country. You can look to its economic stability, its resources, its governance structure, or the security it provides its citizens. But no measure is more important than a country's respect for and adherence to the rule of law. It is the foundation upon which all else rests. And, in my view, it is the single most important source of our country's greatness.

The rule of law is our shared enterprise. You endeavor to make the law, and we judges strive to interpret the law. Our shared commitment to the rule of law, which we have publicly declared to the citizens of Utah when we were sworn in to our respective offices, must continue to resonate throughout the legislative, executive, and judicial branches. I have always respected the careful and thoughtful process this body employs in creating our state's laws. I say this not to flatter you, but because I feel certain you are driven by a belief that our communities benefit from working together to seek common solutions to common problems.

Our judges, too, are careful and thoughtful in resolving the cases brought before them. Each day, in each courthouse and in each courtroom, judges work to interpret and apply the laws you have enacted. The issues presented are wide ranging and the details often complex. Arriving at a just result that honors the rule of law requires each judge to take the time necessary to carefully weigh the merits of the matter, the arguments presented, and to ensure that the law is fairly and consistently applied. For the rule of law to have meaning, the public must be able to trust that the right outcome is reached. In this process, each party must have a voice and be respectfully heard. This concept is as important today as it has ever been, and it can be realized only by investing sufficient time in the case resolution process.

For many years now, the judiciary has worked to quantify the workload that is appropriate for each judge to responsibly bear. This is a critically important calculation; the efficient, timely, and just resolution of cases hangs in the balance. By striking the right balance, judges are able to responsibly and in a timely fashion provide the best possible process to the public.

The judiciary has always appreciated the support that you have provided to ensure there are enough judges available to meet the needs of the people.

Currently, the citizens in the third judicial district, composed of Salt Lake, Tooele, and Summit counties, do not have enough district court judges to meet the demand. While the weighted caseload shows that 6.7 additional judges are needed in the third district, the judicial council has requested that the legislature provide four. During the session, you will have an opportunity to vote to approve these new judges. The people need our careful attention to this matter. They rightfully expect timely service from, and access to, our courts, and we can't deliver it without your assistance and support.

In that same vein, Utah is fortunate to have superb judges, and it's important that we continue to attract new judges of the same caliber. For this reason I urge you to adopt the recommendation on judicial salaries of the Elected Official and Judicial Compensation Commission. I also urge you to support our budget request for an increase in salaries for our dedicated clerical staff.

Finally, I'd like to address the challenge both our branches face in ensuring that Utah citizens have access to our justice system. Each of the past seven years, the World Justice Project has looked at how closely the nations of the world adhere to the rule of law, through a survey of 110,000 households and 3,000 experts.<sup>3</sup> The United States has typically fared well in this assessment. But one area in which our system lags dramatically is in the access to and affordability of civil justice. In the 2017–2018 Index, our country ranked 98<sup>th</sup> out of 113 countries in this important metric. National and local studies also support this conclusion. They suggest that roughly 80% of our civil justice needs go unmet each year.

I'm sure we all recognize that this gap is unacceptable. In our effort to bridge it, we in the judiciary have been working on several innovative solutions to increase access to justice. I'd like to share some details regarding two such initiatives, both brilliantly spearheaded by Justice Himonas.

Utah's 2017 court records reveal that in family law cases 69% of respondents and 56% of petitioners were self-represented. In other types of cases the numbers are even more stark—95% of defendants in eviction cases and 98% of defendants in debt collection cases are self-represented.<sup>4</sup> Yet most people feel ill-equipped to navigate the court system without an attorney and lack confidence in their ability to represent themselves. In 2018, the National Center for State Courts conducted a survey showing that only 36% of people believed they could find the information and tools needed to effectively represent themselves. 62% didn't believe they could effectively do so no matter what resources were provided to them.<sup>5</sup> And yet, many people also report they cannot afford legal representation. These numbers are distressing.

To address this, we have created a new class of legal professional: the licensed paralegal practitioner or LPP, a position akin to the nurse practitioner profession in

medicine. This is the result of several years of dedicated work by individuals both inside and outside the court system. Once licensed, LPPs will be able to provide legal advice and assistance in three areas of law affecting a large number of people: landlord–tenant disputes, debt collection actions, and family law matters. LPPs can provide this legal assistance without undergoing the expense of three years of law school, so they will be able to offer the public a lower cost option than is now available, thereby increasing access to competent legal representation. The first LPPs will begin work later this year.

Another dramatic change we've seen in recent years is that people have grown increasingly accustomed to engaging online with institutions of all types, be it their bank, their school, their doctor, or their government. In response to this shift in public preference and expectation, we're increasing access to the courts through online dispute resolution, or ODR. In its initial implementation, ODR permits parties in small claims matters to resolve their legal dispute without ever entering a physical courthouse. Instead, they can negotiate with each other online using their phone or other device.

This negotiation is asynchronous, meaning it does not require the parties to address the matter at the same time. For instance, one party may communicate a position at the start of the day, while the other party is at work. Later, the other party can respond at a time that is more convenient for him or her. This back and forth exchange of information and ideas can continue over the course of several days, rather than in those stressful minutes just before a court hearing or in front of the judge.

A court-trained volunteer facilitator helps the parties have a conversation that explores all possible resolutions of the case. If the parties are able to reach a settlement, a computer-generated agreement is created; if they are unsuccessful, the facilitator works with the parties to prepare an informational document for the judge. This document assists the parties in focusing their claims and defenses so the judge is better situated to address the parties' positions. It includes written materials, such as contracts or receipts, that the parties intend to rely on at the trial. The parties can then choose to have the judge decide the matter based on the written materials or they can have a traditional small claims trial.

The benefits of this flexible approach are obvious. Simply put, many people never engage in the litigation process, because it requires them to take time off work, go to what they often see as a strange and intimidating courthouse, and to interact with an adversarial party face-to-face. ODR provides them a convenient, quicker, and less stressful way to engage in the judicial process.

This program launched in September 2018 in the West Valley City Justice Court. Early participation is strong, and early feedback is positive. In the four

months the system has been running, over 600 cases have been filed using ODR. We're watching carefully as this program proceeds, tracking outcome data internally. In addition, the National Center for State Courts has agreed to formally and independently evaluate the program after a year by measuring metrics such as participation rates, disposition times, and court efficiencies. I look forward to January next year when I can share additional outcome data with you.

These kinds of innovations and experiments reflect our commitment to expanding access to justice for Utah's citizens in ways that are responsive to what they want, not what is easiest or most convenient for the courts. By using our constitutional responsibility to govern the practice of law and by leveraging rapidly expanding technological advancements, we are delivering new ways of overcoming barriers to justice.

As I consider the many changes taking place in our modern lives, I wonder how different our time really is from that of Mr. Walter Arnold and the advent of motor vehicle laws. Yes, Mr. Arnold was living in a 2 MPH world, while ours runs at 70 MPH—or even the much higher speed at which bits of information travel in cyberspace. But the need to protect and nurture the public's trust and confidence in the rule of law is unchanging. While our fast-paced society and advances in technology may, at times, seem overwhelming, both lawmakers and judges must continue to carefully enact and faithfully adjudicate the law with fidelity. When generations to come look back upon the contributions of our generation, I hope they will conclude that we honored and respected the rule of law.

I deeply appreciate your service to Utah's citizens, and I wish you a productive session. Thank you.
