Pledge of Allegiance led by Representative Carl Albrecht.

**MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS**

The Chief Clerk, Megan Allen, read the following:

**PROCLAMATION**

**WHEREAS**, Article VI, Section 2 of the Utah Constitution authorizes the President of the Utah Senate and the Speaker of the Utah House of Representatives to issue a joint proclamation convening the Utah Legislature in a special session when two-thirds of the members of the Senate and House of Representatives favor convening the Legislature into a special session because an emergency in the affairs of the state necessitates convening the Legislature into session; and

**WHEREAS**, a poll conducted by the President of the Utah Senate and the Speaker of the Utah House of Representatives determined that at least two-thirds of the members of the Utah Senate and at least two-thirds of the members of the Utah House of Representatives are in favor of convening the Legislature into a special session because of the COVID-19 emergency and the economic consequences of that emergency;

**NOW, THEREFORE**, we, J. Stuart Adams, President of the Utah Senate, and Brad R. Wilson, Speaker of the Utah House of Representatives, by the authority vested in us by the Utah Constitution, do by this joint proclamation, call

the Sixty–Third Legislature of the State of Utah into a Sixth Special Session to be conducted electronically with the anchor location at the Utah State Capitol in Salt Lake City, Utah on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of August, 2020, at 10:00 a.m. to consider legislation:

22. making changes to the emergency drill requirements for certain educational facilities;

23. amending the qualifications to serve as the executive director of the Department of Health;

24. modifying provisions related to the regulation of tobacco retailers:

25. modifying the election process for the 2020 regular general election in response to the COVID–19 pandemic and modifying ballot harvesting provisions for all elections;

26. amending the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act to delay license renewal deadlines for certain retail licenses, to adjust the percentage of annual gross receipts from the sale of alcoholic products that a reception center licensee may maintain and what is included in that percentage, and to allow certain public service permittees to change location under certain conditions;

27. addressing issues related to public education funding and enrollment;

28. modifying provisions relating to community reinvestment agencies to provide an extension of the tax increment collection period for certain agencies impacted by COVID–19 and to allow agencies to provide assistance to certain small businesses negatively impacted by COVID–19;

29. enacting the Uniform Electronic Wills Act;

30. amending the income tax provisions to provide that forgiven loans and individual recovery rebates authorized by the federal government in response to COVID–19 are not subject to Utah income tax;

31. adjusting the fiscal year 2021 budget to address the COVID–19 emergency and its impacts and other budget issues;

32. addressing emergency powers and the state of emergency in response to the COVID–19 pandemic:

33. addressing issues related to online instruction provided by schools licensed under the Cosmetology and Associated Professions Licensing Act;

34. addressing the modification of jail sentences in a public health emergency;

35. addressing the inadequacy of the amount of federal government payments in lieu of taxes;

36. modifying the statutory provision regarding when a local referendum ballot question may be submitted to voters;

37. addressing issues related to the federal CARES Act and other federal legislation enacted in response to the COVID–19 pandemic, including modifying certain COVID–19 assistance and recovery programs created in the state that are using federal funding;

38. amending the maximum premium subsidy the Department of Health can request for the Utah Premium Partnership for Health Insurance program;

39. modifying the date by which the governor must submit an audited financial statement for the last fiscal year;

40. modifying application limit requirements for the Public Safety Officer Career Advancement Reimbursement Program;

41. that, except for rules and fees applicable to activities in counties of the first and second class, and for specific time periods and unless specified conditions are met, prohibits the Board and Division of Oil, Gas, and Mining, the Board and Division of Water Quality, and the Board and Division of Air Quality from: taking rulemaking action under Title 40, Mines and Mining, or related to water and air quality under Title 19, Environmental Quality Code; and imposing new fees or fee increases under Title 40, Mines and Mining, or related to water and air quality under Title 19, Environmental Quality Code;

42. delaying certain reporting requirements regarding the price of pharmaceutical drugs; and

22. repealing certain provisions that allow a municipality to annex certain unincorporated areas without an annexation petition.

### **MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS**

Roll call showed all members present.

Speaker Wilson announced that pursuant to Joint Rule 2-1-101, the Rules adopted by the Legislature during the 2020 General Session apply to the conduct of the House during the 2020 Sixth Special Session.

Due to the virtual setup of this session, in lieu of notifying committees, Speaker Wilson appointed Representative Joel Briscoe to notify the Governor, via

email, that the House is convened in the Sixth Special Session and is organized and ready to receive any communication or message he may have to offer.

Speaker Wilson appointed Representative Ray Ward to notify the Senate, via email, that the House is organized and ready to do business.

Representative Ward reported that, for the purposes of meeting electronically, the Senate has been notified via email that the House is organized and ready to do business.

Representative Briscoe reported that, for the purposes of meeting electronically, Governor Herbert has been notified via email that the Legislature is organized and ready to do business.

On motion of Representative Hawkes, as allowed by the Utah Constitution and the Joint Rules of the Legislature, the House voted to continue its practice of reading only the short title of bills and resolutions as they are introduced or considered on a House Calendar and not read the long title of the bills and resolutions unless two-thirds of the House directs the reading of the long title, short title, or both of any House or Senate bill or resolution.

On motion of Representative King, the House voted to suspend the rule requiring that bills and resolutions remain on a calendar for one legislative day between second and third readings.

On motion of Representative Gibson, the House voted that the House suspend the following rules due to the virtual circumstance of this session: Joint Rule 1-2-101, Joint Rule 1-2-102, and Joint Rule 1-2-103 regarding Notifying Committees; Joint Rule 4-1-202(h) and Joint Rule 4-2-101(ii) regarding cosponsors; and House Rule 1-5-103 regarding the Daily Order of Business.

### REMARKS BY SPEAKER BRAD WILSON

Once again, welcome Representatives to yet another special session of the Utah Legislature. I want to begin today by expressing my sincere gratitude to each of you for the service you render on behalf of your constituents and on behalf of all the people of our state.

This is the SIXTH special session of 2020 – and we concluded the General Session just FIVE months ago. Since closing sine die in March, the global

pandemic has forced us all to make significant and temporary changes to our way of life to protect our families, friends and neighbors. Those changes sent an immediate and difficult-to-measure ripple effect through our state, and have made it necessary for us to reconvene more frequently than usual. During our special sessions this year we have worked on 85 bills and 30 formal substitutes for bills. We have passed 12 budget and revenue bills and reworked the state budget 4 times to adjust to the ripple effect of the current health crisis. To provide some additional perspective, it took until the fourth week of the 2020 General Session for us to pass as many bills as we have in special sessions this year.

As House leadership, we have recognized the urgency of each of these issues and feel each has merited your timely consideration. But, they say the more you do something, the less special it becomes. As I've reflected on that, I feel it important to make something clear so that our much more frequent meetings this year do not send the wrong message either within our body or to the public. These are extraordinary circumstances. This is not and cannot become the new normal for the House. Utah benefits greatly from the service of a part-time legislature and must continue to do so. We must not allow the COVID-19 pandemic to trigger a transition to a full-time legislative body. It is simply not in the best interest of the people.

Within the House of Representatives, we have elected officials who are engineers, ranchers and researchers. We have homemakers, small business owners and teachers. We have more than a few attorneys, some bankers and developers. We have surgeons, a police officer and, perhaps most appropriately, we now have a referee (Rep. Birkeland). Each of us brings a unique perspective to our policy discussions and, even more importantly, each of us is more directly impacted by the policies we enact because we live and work in the real world. I would argue Utah's system of a part-time legislature – one that is supposed to meet in session just over one-tenth of the year – much more closely adheres to the original design of our nation's founding fathers than a full-time legislative body would. By the voice of the people, we serve for a season but we do so as we remain citizens first and lawmakers second.

While recognizing that you have all given more than you originally bargained for, so have the many dedicated members of our staff. They have also had additional demands made on their time and they have each answered the call. They deserve our sincere gratitude for all they do. We meet today to deliberate and debate the best path forward for the people of our state on issues caused by the pandemic ranging from educating our students... to regulating commerce... to matters of health and public safety.

So, again, I thank you for your service, for taking considerable time from your jobs, your businesses and your families – all to address urgent and pressing matters facing your districts and our state. Now, to the business at hand.

(i) cease all operations at the public service permittee's current

(b) During the 30-day period described in Subsection (4)(a), a public service permittee may not:

(i) sell, offer for sale, furnish, or allow the consumption of an alcoholic product at the original and newly approved location within the international airport at the same time; or

(ii) store an alcoholic product at the original and newly approved location within the international airport for more than 72 hours.

The Senate passed, as substituted, **1st Sub. S.B. 6001, COMMUNITY REINVESTMENT AGENCY MODIFICATIONS**, by Senator W. Harper, and it is transmitted for consideration; and
