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**LONG TITLE**

**General Description:**

This bill provides for removal of a voter's name from the official register of voters upon the voter's death.

**Highlighted Provisions:**

This bill:

- requires the state registrar to provide the lieutenant governor's office with certain information relating to deceased individuals to ensure that the individuals are removed from the official register of voters;

- requires the lieutenant governor to provide the information described in the preceding paragraph to the county clerks, who are required to remove deceased individuals from the official register of voters; and

- requires the lieutenant governor to take certain action to ensure that the county clerks have complied with the requirements of this bill.

32 *Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:*

33 Section 1. Section **20A-2-306** is amended to read:

34 **20A-2-306. Removing names from the official register -- Determining and**  
35 **confirming change of residence.**

36 (1) A county clerk may not remove a voter's name from the official register on the  
37 grounds that the voter has changed residence unless the voter:

38 (a) confirms in writing that the voter has changed residence to a place outside the  
39 county; or

40 (b) (i) has not voted in an election during the period beginning on the date of the notice  
41 required by Subsection (3), and ending on the day after the date of the second regular general  
42 election occurring after the date of the notice; and

43 (ii) has failed to respond to the notice required by Subsection (3).

44 (2) (a) When a county clerk obtains information that a voter's address has changed and  
45 it appears that the voter still resides within the same county, the county clerk shall:

46 (i) change the official register to show the voter's new address; and

47 (ii) send to the voter, by forwardable mail, the notice required by Subsection (3)  
48 printed on a postage prepaid, preaddressed return form.

49 (b) When a county clerk obtains information that a voter's address has changed and it  
50 appears that the voter now resides in a different county, the county clerk shall verify the  
51 changed residence by sending to the voter, by forwardable mail, the notice required by  
52 Subsection (3) printed on a postage prepaid, preaddressed return form.

53 (3) Each county clerk shall use substantially the following form to notify voters whose  
54 addresses have changed:

55            ["]VOTER REGISTRATION NOTICE

56            We have been notified that your residence has changed. Please read, complete, and  
 57 return this form so that we can update our voter registration records. What is your current  
 58 street address?

61            If you have not changed your residence or have moved but stayed within the same  
 62 county, you must complete and return this form to the county clerk so that it is received by the  
 63 county clerk before 5 p.m. no later than 30 days before the date of the election. If you fail to  
 64 return this form within that time:

65            - you may be required to show evidence of your address to the poll worker before being  
 66 allowed to vote in either of the next two regular general elections; or

67            - if you fail to vote at least once from the date this notice was mailed until the passing  
 68 of two regular general elections, you will no longer be registered to vote. If you have changed  
 69 your residence and have moved to a different county in Utah, you may register to vote by  
 70 contacting the county clerk in your county.

73    PRIVACY INFORMATION

74            Voter registration records contain some information that is available to the public, such  
 75 as your name and address, some information that is available only to government entities, and  
 76 some information that is available only to certain third parties in accordance with the  
 77 requirements of law.

78            Your driver license number, identification card number, social security number, email  
 79 address, and full date of birth are available only to government entities. Your year of birth is  
 80 available to political parties, candidates for public office, certain third parties, and their  
 81 contractors, employees, and volunteers, in accordance with the requirements of law.

82 You may request that all information on your voter registration records be withheld  
83 from all persons other than government entities, political parties, candidates for public office,  
84 and their contractors, employees, and volunteers, by indicating here:

85 \_\_\_\_\_ Yes, I request that all information on my voter registration records be withheld  
86 from all persons other than government entities, political parties, candidates for public office,  
87 and their contractors, employees, and volunteers.

88 REQUEST FOR ADDITIONAL PRIVACY PROTECTION

89 In addition to the protections provided above, you may request that all information on  
90 your voter registration records be withheld from all political parties, candidates for public  
91 office, and their contractors, employees, and volunteers, by submitting a withholding request  
92 form, and any required verification, as described in the following paragraphs.

93 A person may request that all information on the person's voter registration records be  
94 withheld from all political parties, candidates for public office, and their contractors,  
95 employees, and volunteers, by submitting a withholding request form with this registration  
96 record, or to the lieutenant governor or a county clerk, if the person is or is likely to be, or  
97 resides with a person who is or is likely to be, a victim of domestic violence or dating violence.

98 A person may request that all information on the person's voter registration records be  
99 withheld from all political parties, candidates for public office, and their contractors,  
100 employees, and volunteers, by submitting a withholding request form and any required  
101 verification with this registration form, or to the lieutenant governor or a county clerk, if the  
102 person is, or resides with a person who is, a law enforcement officer, a member of the armed  
103 forces, a public figure, or protected by a protective order or a protection order.

104 (4) (a) Except as provided in Subsection (4)(b), the county clerk may not remove the  
105 names of any voters from the official register during the 90 days before a regular primary  
106 election and the 90 days before a regular general election.

107 (b) The county clerk may remove the names of voters from the official register during  
108 the 90 days before a regular primary election and the 90 days before a regular general election

109 if:

110 (i) the voter requests, in writing, that the voter's name be removed; or

111 (ii) the voter has died.

112 (c) (i) After a county clerk mails a notice as required in this section, the county clerk  
113 may list that voter as inactive.

114 (ii) If a county clerk receives a returned voter identification card, determines that there  
115 was no clerical error causing the card to be returned, and has no further information to contact  
116 the voter, the county clerk may list that voter as inactive.

117 (iii) An inactive voter shall be allowed to vote, sign petitions, and have all other  
118 privileges of a registered voter.

119 (iv) A county is not required to send routine mailings to an inactive voter and is not  
120 required to count inactive voters when dividing precincts and preparing supplies.

121 (5) Beginning on or before January 1, 2022, the lieutenant governor shall make  
122 available to a county clerk United States Social Security Administration data received by the  
123 lieutenant governor regarding deceased individuals.

124 (6) A county clerk shall, within ten business days after the day on which the county  
125 clerk receives the information described in Subsection (5) or Subsections 26-2-13(11) and (12)  
126 relating to a decedent whose name appears on the official register, remove the decedent's name  
127 from the official register.

128 (7) Ninety days before a regular primary election and 90 days before a regular general  
129 election the lieutenant governor shall compare the information the lieutenant governor has  
130 received under Subsection 26-2-13(11) with the official register of voters to ensure that all  
131 deceased voters have been removed from the official register.

132 Section 2. Section **26-2-13** is amended to read:

133 **26-2-13. Certificate of death -- Execution and registration requirements --**  
134 **Information provided to lieutenant governor.**

135 (1) (a) A certificate of death for each death that occurs in this state shall be filed with

136 the local registrar of the district in which the death occurs, or as otherwise directed by the state  
137 registrar, within five days after death and prior to the decedent's interment, any other disposal,  
138 or removal from the registration district where the death occurred.

139 (b) A certificate of death shall be registered if the certificate of death is completed and  
140 filed in accordance with this chapter.

141 (2) (a) If the place of death is unknown but the dead body is found in this state:

142 (i) the certificate of death shall be completed and filed in accordance with this section;

143 and

144 (ii) the place where the dead body is found shall be shown as the place of death.

145 (b) If the date of death is unknown, the date shall be determined by approximation.

146 (3) (a) When death occurs in a moving conveyance in the United States and the

147 decedent is first removed from the conveyance in this state:

148 (i) the certificate of death shall be filed with:

149 (A) the local registrar of the district where the decedent is removed; or

150 (B) a person designated by the state registrar; and

151 (ii) the place where the decedent is removed shall be considered the place of death.

152 (b) When a death occurs on a moving conveyance outside the United States and the

153 decedent is first removed from the conveyance in this state:

154 (i) the certificate of death shall be filed with:

155 (A) the local registrar of the district where the decedent is removed; or

156 (B) a person designated by the state registrar; and

157 (ii) the certificate of death shall show the actual place of death to the extent it can be

158 determined.

159 (4) (a) Subject to Subsections (4)(d) and (10), a custodial funeral service director or, if a  
160 funeral service director is not retained, a dispositioner shall sign the certificate of death.

161 (b) The custodial funeral service director, an agent of the custodial funeral service  
162 director, or, if a funeral service director is not retained, a dispositioner shall:

163 (i) file the certificate of death prior to any disposition of a dead body or fetus; and  
164 (ii) obtain the decedent's personal data from the next of kin or the best qualified person  
165 or source available, including the decedent's [~~Social Security~~] social security number, if known.

166 (c) The certificate of death may not include the decedent's [~~Social Security~~] social  
167 security number.

168 (d) A dispositioner may not sign a certificate of death, unless the signature is witnessed  
169 by the state registrar or a local registrar.

170 (5) (a) Except as provided in Section 26-2-14, fetal death certificates, the medical  
171 section of the certificate of death shall be completed, signed, and returned to the funeral service  
172 director, or, if a funeral service director is not retained, a dispositioner, within 72 hours after  
173 death by the health care professional who was in charge of the decedent's care for the illness or  
174 condition which resulted in death, except when inquiry is required by Title 26, Chapter 4, Utah  
175 Medical Examiner Act.

176 (b) In the absence of the health care professional or with the health care professional's  
177 approval, the certificate of death may be completed and signed by an associate physician, the  
178 chief medical officer of the institution in which death occurred, or a physician who performed  
179 an autopsy upon the decedent, if:

- 180 (i) the person has access to the medical history of the case;
- 181 (ii) the person views the decedent at or after death; and
- 182 (iii) the death is not due to causes required to be investigated by the medical examiner.

183 (6) When death occurs more than 30 days after the decedent was last treated by a health  
184 care professional, the case shall be referred to the medical examiner for investigation to  
185 determine and certify the cause, date, and place of death.

186 (7) When inquiry is required by Title 26, Chapter 4, Utah Medical Examiner Act, the  
187 medical examiner shall make an investigation and complete and sign the medical section of the  
188 certificate of death within 72 hours after taking charge of the case.

189 (8) If the cause of death cannot be determined within 72 hours after death:

190 (a) the medical section of the certificate of death shall be completed as provided by  
191 department rule;

192 (b) the attending health care professional or medical examiner shall give the funeral  
193 service director, or, if a funeral service director is not retained, a dispositioner, notice of the  
194 reason for the delay; and

195 (c) final disposition of the decedent may not be made until authorized by the attending  
196 health care professional or medical examiner.

197 (9) (a) When a death is presumed to have occurred within this state but the dead body  
198 cannot be located, a certificate of death may be prepared by the state registrar upon receipt of  
199 an order of a Utah district court.

200 (b) The order described in Subsection (9)(a) shall include a finding of fact stating the  
201 name of the decedent, the date of death, and the place of death.

202 (c) A certificate of death prepared under Subsection (9)(a) shall:

203 (i) show the date of registration; and

204 (ii) identify the court and the date of the order.

205 (10) It is unlawful for a dispositioner to charge for or accept any remuneration for:

206 (a) signing a certificate of death; or

207 (b) performing any other duty of a dispositioner, as described in this section.

208 (11) The state registrar shall, within five business days after the day on which the state  
209 registrar or local registrar registers a certificate of death for a Utah resident, inform the  
210 lieutenant governor of:

211 (a) the decedent's name, last known residential address, date of birth, and date of death;  
212 and

213 (b) any other information requested by the lieutenant governor to assist the county  
214 clerk in identifying the decedent for the purpose of removing the decedent from the official  
215 register of voters.

216 (12) The lieutenant governor shall, within one business day after the day on which the



217 lieutenant governor receives the information described in Subsection (11), provide the  
218 information to the county clerks.
