LONG TITLE

General Description:

This bill creates the Radon Task Force.

Highlighted Provisions:

This bill:

- ▶ defines terms;
- ▶ creates the Radon Task Force;
- ▶ provides for the appointment of task force members;
- ▶ requires the task force to study and make recommendations on:
 - ways to increase public awareness about the risks of radon; and
 - ways to mitigate Utah residents' exposure to radon;
- ▶ requires the task force to report to the Natural Resources, Agriculture, and Environment Interim Committee; and
- ▶ provides a sunset date for the task force.

31 *Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:*

32 Section 1. Section **36-29-108** is enacted to read:

33 **36-29-108. Radon Task Force.**

34 (1) As used in this section:

35 (a) "Committee" means the Natural Resources, Agriculture, and Environment Interim
36 Committee.

37 (b) "Task force" means the Radon Task Force described in Subsection (2).

38 (2) There is created the Radon Task Force consisting of the following 11 members:

39 (a) two members of the Senate appointed by the president of the Senate;

40 (b) two members of the House of Representatives appointed by the speaker of the
41 House of Representatives;

42 (c) the executive director of the Utah Department of Environmental Quality, or the
43 executive director's designee;

44 (d) the executive director of the Utah Department of Health, or the executive director's
45 designee; and

46 (e) the following five members appointed by the governor:

47 (i) one individual who possesses expertise in the field of radon testing and mitigation;

48 (ii) one individual who represents the real estate field;

49 (iii) one individual who represents the construction industry;

50 (iv) one individual who possesses expertise in the field of geology; and

51 (v) one individual who represents a local health department.

52 (3) (a) The president of the Senate shall designate a member of the Senate appointed
53 under Subsection (2)(a) as a cochair of the task force.

54 (b) The speaker of the House of Representatives shall designate a member of the House
55 of Representatives appointed under Subsection (2)(b) as a cochair of the task force.

56 (4) Each individual with authority to appoint an individual under Subsection (2), or to

57 make a designation under Subsection (2), shall make the appointment or designation on or
58 before May 30, 2021.

59 (5) (a) The individual who appointed a task force member may remove that task force
60 member from the task force.

61 (b) If a task force member described in Subsection (2)(a) or (b) leaves the member's
62 legislative office, the individual may not continue to serve as a task force member.

63 (c) A vacancy in a position appointed under Subsections (2)(a) through (e) shall be
64 filled by appointing a replacement member in the same manner as the member creating the
65 vacancy was appointed.

66 (6) (a) A majority of the members of the task force constitutes a quorum.

67 (b) The action of a quorum of the task force constitutes an action of the task force.

68 (7) (a) Except as provided in Subsection (8), a task force member may not receive
69 compensation or benefits for the member's service on the task force but may receive per diem
70 and travel expenses incurred as a task force member in accordance with:

71 (a) Section [63A-3-106](#);

72 (b) Section [63A-3-107](#); and

73 (c) rules made by the Division of Finance pursuant to Sections [63A-3-106](#) and
74 [63A-3-107](#).

75 (8) Compensation and expenses of a task force member who is a legislator are
76 governed by Section [36-2-2](#) and Legislative Joint Rules, Title 5, Chapter 3, Legislator
77 Compensation.

78 (9) The Office of Legislative Research and General Counsel shall provide staff support
79 to the task force.

80 (10) The task force shall study and make recommendations to the committee on:

81 (a) ways to increase public education and outreach regarding the risks of radon; and

82 (b) ways to mitigate Utah residents' exposure to radon.

83 (11) The task force may recommend legislation to the committee.

84 (12) The task force shall convene its initial meeting on or before July 1, 2021.

85 (13) The task force shall provide a report to the committee during or before the
86 November interim meeting in 2021.

87 (14) No later than the first interim meeting in 2022, the task force shall provide a final

88 report to the committee.

89 (15) The task force shall ensure that each meeting of the task force complies with Title
90 52, Chapter 4, Open and Public Meetings Act.
