EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES REVISIONS

2021 GENERAL SESSION

LONG TITLE

General Description:

This bill amends provisions related to emergency medical services.

10 **Highlighted Provisions:**

This bill:

- ▶ defines terms;
- ▶ requires municipalities and counties to ensure at least a minimum level of 911 ambulance services are provided within the municipality or county;
- ▶ extends certain requirements for the selection of ambulance and paramedics to all other municipalities, counties, local districts, and special service districts;
- ▶ requires the State Emergency Medical Services Committee to adopt rules defining the minimum level of 911 ambulance services provided within municipalities and counties;
- ▶ allows the Department of Health to align the boundaries of an ambulance or paramedic provider's exclusive geographic service area with the boundaries of a local subdivision in certain circumstances;
- ▶ allows a political subdivision to terminate a contract with a 911 ambulance service in certain circumstances;



26 ▶ modifies provisions related to the Department of Health's renewal of certain
27 licenses; and
28 ▶ makes technical and conforming changes.

53 **911 call received by a designated dispatch center that receives 911 or E911 calls.**
54 **(b) "911 ambulance services" does not mean a seven or ten digit telephone call**

83 **11-48-103. Provision of 911 ambulance services in municipalities and counties.**

84 (1) The governing body of each municipality and county shall, subject to Title 26,
85 Chapter 8a, Part 4, Ambulance and Paramedic Providers, ensure at least a minimum level of
86 911 ambulance services are provided:

87 (a) within the territorial limits of the municipality or county;

88 (b) by a ground ambulance provider, licensed by the Department of Health under Title
89 26, Chapter 8a, Part 4, Ambulance and Paramedic Providers; and
90 (c) in accordance with rules established by the State Emergency Medical Services
91 Committee under Subsection 26-8a-104(8).

92 (2) A municipality or county may:

93 (a) subject to Subsection (3), maintain and support 911 ambulance services for the
94 municipality's or county's own jurisdiction; or
95 (b) contract to:

(C) both 911 ambulance and paramedic service; and

(b) "911 ambulance or paramedic [service] services" does not mean a seven or ten digit telephone call received directly by an ambulance provider licensed under this chapter.

(2) "Ambulance" means a ground, air, or water vehicle that:

(a) transports patients and is used to provide emergency medical services; and

(b) is required to obtain a permit under Section 26-8a-304 to operate in the state.

(3) "Ambulance provider" means an emergency medical service provider that:

(a) transports and provides emergency medical care to patients; and

(b) is required to obtain a license under Part 4, Ambulance and Paramedic Providers.

(4) "Committee" means the State Emergency Medical Services Committee created by Section 26-1-7.

(5) "Direct medical observation" means in-person observation of a patient by a physician, registered nurse, physician's assistant, or individual licensed under Section 26-8a-302.

(6) "Emergency medical condition" means:

(a) a medical condition that manifests itself by symptoms of sufficient severity, including severe pain, that a prudent layperson, who possesses an average knowledge of health and medicine, could reasonably expect the absence of immediate medical attention to result in:

(i) placing the individual's health in serious jeopardy;

(ii) serious impairment to bodily functions; or

(iii) serious dysfunction of any bodily organ or part; or

(b) a medical condition that in the opinion of a physician or [his] the physician's designee requires direct medical observation during transport or may require the intervention of an individual licensed under Section 26-8a-302 during transport.

(7) "Emergency medical service personnel":

(a) means an individual who provides emergency medical services to a patient and is required to be licensed under Section 26-8a-302; and

(b) includes a paramedic, medical director of a licensed emergency medical service

150 provider, emergency medical service instructor, and other categories established by the
151 committee.

152 (8) "Emergency medical service providers" means:

153 (a) licensed ambulance providers and paramedic providers;

154 (b) a facility or provider that is required to be designated under Subsection

157 (9) "Emergency medical services" means medical services, transportation services, or
158 both rendered to a patient.

- (a) provides nonemergency secure transportation services for an individual who:
 - (i) is not required to be transported by an ambulance under Section 26-8a-305; and
 - (ii) requires behavioral health observation during transport between any of the following facilities:
 - (A) a licensed acute care hospital;
 - (B) an emergency patient receiving facility;
 - (C) a licensed mental health facility; and
 - (D) the office of a licensed health care provider; and
- (b) is required to be designated under Section 26-8a-303.

(16) "Paramedic provider" means an entity that:

- (a) employs emergency medical service personnel; and
- (b) is required to obtain a license under Part 4, Ambulance and Paramedic Providers.

(17) "Patient" means an individual who, as the result of illness or injury, meets any of the criteria in Section 26-8a-305.

(18) "Political subdivision" means:

- (a) a city [or], town [~~located in a county of the first or second class as defined in Section 17-50-501~~], or metro township;
- (b) a county [~~of the first or second class~~];
- [~~(c) the following districts located in a county of the first or second class:~~]
- [~~(d)~~] (c) a special service district created under Title 17D, Chapter 1, Special Service District Act, for the purpose of providing fire protection services under Subsection 17D-1-201(9); [or]

212 (19) "Trauma" means an injury requiring immediate medical or surgical intervention.

213 (20) "Trauma system" means a single, statewide system that:

214 (a) organizes and coordinates the delivery of trauma care within defined geographic
215 areas from the time of injury through transport and rehabilitative care; and

216 (b) is inclusive of all prehospital providers, hospitals, and rehabilitative facilities in
217 delivering care for trauma patients, regardless of severity.

218 (21) "Triage" means the sorting of patients in terms of disposition, destination, or
219 priority. For prehospital trauma victims, triage requires a determination of injury severity to
220 assess the appropriate level of care according to established patient care protocols.

221 (22) "Triage, treatment, transportation, and transfer guidelines" means written
222 procedures that:

223 (a) direct the care of patients; and

224 (b) are adopted by the medical staff of an emergency patient receiving facility, trauma
225 center, or an emergency medical service provider.

227 **26-8a-104. Committee advisory duties.**

228 The committee shall adopt rules, with the concurrence of the department, in accordance
229 with Title 63G, Chapter 3, Utah Administrative Rulemaking Act, that:

230 (1) establish licensure and reciprocity requirements under Section **26-8a-302**;

231 (2) establish designation requirements under Section **26-8a-303**;

232 (3) promote the development of a statewide emergency medical services system under
233 Section **26-8a-203**;

234 (4) establish insurance requirements for ambulance providers;

244 **26-8a-401. State regulation of emergency medical services market -- License**
245 **term.**

246 (1) To ensure emergency medical service quality and minimize unnecessary
247 duplication, the department shall regulate the emergency medical [service] services market
248 [after October 1, 1999,] by creating and operating a statewide system that:

249 (a) consists of exclusive geographic service areas as provided in Section **26-8a-402**;
250 and

251 (b) establishes maximum rates as provided in Section **26-8a-403**.

252 [(2) (a) All licenses issued prior to July 1, 1996, shall expire as stated in the license.]

253 [(b) If no expiration date is stated on a license issued before July 1, 1996, the license
254 shall expire on October 1, 1999, unless:]

280 (1) Each ground ambulance provider license issued under this part shall be for an
281 exclusive geographic service area as described in the license. Only the licensed ground
282 ambulance provider may respond to an ambulance request that originates within the provider's
283 exclusive geographic service area, except as provided in Subsection (5) and Section 26-8a-416.

284 (2) Each paramedic provider license issued under this part shall be for an exclusive
285 geographic service area as described in the license. Only the licensed paramedic provider may
286 respond to a paramedic request that originates within the exclusive geographic service area,
287 except as provided in Subsection (6) and Section 26-8a-416.

288 (3) Nothing in this section may be construed as either requiring or prohibiting that the
289 formation of boundaries in a given location be the same for a licensed paramedic provider [as it
290 is for] and a licensed ambulance provider.

292 into a mutual aid agreement to allow another licensed provider to give assistance in times of

315 alignment; and

316 (c) taking into consideration the requirements of:

317 (i) Section 11-48-103; and

319 Section 8. Section **26-8a-405.1** is amended to read:

320 **26-8a-405.1. Selection of provider by political subdivision.**

321 (1) (a) Only an applicant approved under Section **26-8a-405** may respond to a request
322 for a proposal issued in accordance with Section **26-8a-405.2** or Section **26-8a-405.4** by a
323 political subdivision.

324 (b) A response to a request for proposal is subject to the maximum rates established by
325 the department under Section **26-8a-403**.

326 (c) A political subdivision may award a contract to an applicant in response to a
327 request for proposal:

328 (i) in accordance with Section **26-8a-405.2**; and

329 (ii) subject to [Subsection (2)] Subsections (2) and (3).

330 (2) (a) The department shall issue a license to an applicant selected by a political
331 subdivision under Subsection (1) unless the department finds that issuing a license to that
332 applicant would jeopardize the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the geographic
333 service area.

334 (b) A license issued under this Subsection (2):

335 (i) is for the exclusive geographic service area approved by the department in

376 [~~(2)~~] (1) (a) This section applies to a non-911 provider license under this chapter.

429 (b) Competitive sealed proposals for non-911 services under Subsection (1)(a) shall be
430 solicited through a request for proposal and the provisions of this section.

431 (c) (i) Notice of the request for proposals shall be published:

432 (A) at least once a week for three consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general
433 circulation published in the county; or

434 (B) if there is no such newspaper, then notice shall be posted for at least 20 days in at
435 least five public places in the county; and

436 (ii) in accordance with Section 45-1-101 for at least 20 days.

437 (2) (a) Proposals shall be opened so as to avoid disclosure of contents to competing
438 offerors during the process of negotiations.

439 (b) (i) Subsequent to the published notice, and prior to selecting an applicant, the
440 department shall hold a presubmission conference with interested applicants for the purpose of
441 assuring full understanding of, and responsiveness to, solicitation requirements.

442 (ii) The department shall allow at least 90 days from the presubmission conference for
443 the proposers to submit proposals.

444 (c) Subsequent to the presubmission conference, the department may issue addenda to
445 the request for proposals. An addenda to a request for proposal shall be finalized and posted by
446 the department at least 45 days before the day on which the proposal must be submitted.

447 (d) Offerors to the request for proposals shall be accorded fair and equal treatment with
448 respect to any opportunity for discussion and revisions of proposals, and revisions may be
449 permitted after submission and before a contract is awarded for the purpose of obtaining best
450 and final offers.

451 (e) In conducting discussions, there shall be no disclosures of any information derived
452 from proposals submitted by competing offerors.

453 (3) (a) (i) The department may select an applicant approved by the department under
454 Section 26-8a-404 to provide non-911 services by contract to the most responsible offeror as
455 defined in Section 63G-6a-103.

456 (ii) An award under Subsection (3)(a)(i) shall be made to the responsible offeror whose
457 proposal is determined in writing to be the most advantageous to the public, taking into
458 consideration price and the evaluation factors set forth in the request for proposal.

459 (b) The applicants who are approved under Section 26-8a-405 and who are selected

460 under this section may be the political subdivision responding to the request for competitive
461 sealed proposals, or any other public entity or entities, any private person or entity, or any
462 combination thereof.

463 (c) The department may reject all of the competitive proposals.

464 (4) In seeking competitive sealed proposals and awarding contracts under this section,
465 the department:

466 (a) shall consider the public convenience and necessity factors listed in Subsections
467 ~~26-8a-408~~(2) through (6);

468 (b) shall require the applicant responding to the proposal to disclose how the applicant
469 will meet performance standards in the request for proposal;

470 (c) may not require or restrict an applicant to a certain method of meeting the
471 performance standards, including:

472 (i) requiring ambulance medical personnel to also be a firefighter; or

473 (ii) mandating that offerors use fire stations or dispatch services of the political
474 subdivision;

475 (d) shall require an applicant to submit the proposal:

476 (i) based on full cost accounting in accordance with generally accepted accounting
477 principals; and

478 (ii) if the applicant is a governmental entity, in addition to the requirements of
479 Subsection (4)(e)(i), in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards and
480 in compliance with the State of Utah Legal Compliance Audit Guide; and

481 (e) shall set forth in the request for proposal:

482 (i) the method for determining full cost accounting in accordance with generally
483 accepted accounting principles, and require an applicant to submit the proposal based on such
484 full cost accounting principles;

485 (ii) guidelines established to further competition and provider accountability; and

486 (iii) a list of the factors that will be considered by the department in the award of the
487 contract, including by percentage, the relative weight of the factors established under this
488 Subsection (4)(e), which may include ~~such things as~~:

489 (A) response times;

490 (B) staging locations;

491 (C) experience;
492 (D) quality of care; and
493 (E) cost, consistent with the cost accounting method in Subsection (4)(e)(i).

494 (5) A license issued under this section:
495 (a) is for the exclusive geographic service area approved by the department;
496 (b) is valid for four years;
497 (c) is not subject to a request for license from another applicant under the provisions of
498 Sections 26-8a-406 through 26-8a-409 during the four-year term, unless the applicant's license
499 is revoked under Section 26-8a-504;

500 (d) is subject to supervision by the department under Sections 26-8a-503 and
501 26-8a-504; and

502 (e) except as provided in Subsection (4)(a), is not subject to the provisions of Sections
503 26-8a-406 through 26-8a-409.

506 (1) A licensed provider desiring to renew its license shall meet the renewal
507 requirements established by department rule.

508 (2) The department shall issue a renewal license for a ground ambulance provider or a
509 paramedic provider upon the licensee's application for a renewal and without a public hearing
510 if [there has been]:

511 (a) the applicant was licensed under the provisions of Sections 26-8a-406 through
512 26-8a-409; and

514 [¶] (i) no change in controlling interest in the ownership of the licensee as defined in

524 (3) (a) (i) The provisions of this Subsection (3) apply to a provider licensed under the

527 through (d), and this Subsection (3) are met.

528 (b) (i) The department shall issue a renewal license to a provider upon the provider's
