139	[(20)] (21) "Farm tractor" means a motor vehicle designed and used primarily as a farm
140	implement, for drawing plows, mowing machines, and other implements of husbandry.
141	[(21)] (22) "Flammable liquid" means a liquid that has a flashpoint of 100 degrees F. or
142	less, as determined by a tagliabue or equivalent closed-cup test device.
143	[(22)] (23) "Freeway" means a controlled-access highway that is part of the interstate
144	system as defined in Section 72-1-102.
145	[(23)] (24) (a) "Golf cart" means a device that:
146	(i) is designed for transportation by players on a golf course;
147	(ii) has not less than three wheels in contact with the ground;
148	(iii) has an unladen weight of less than 1,800 pounds;
149	(iv) is designed to operate at low speeds; and

[(27)] (28) "Highway authority" means the same as that term is defined in Section 167 168 72-1-102. 191	[(32)] (33) "Limited access highway" means a highway:
192	(a) that is designated specifically for through traffic; and
193	(b) over, from, or to which neither owners nor occupants of abutting lands nor other
194	persons have any right or easement, or have only a limited right or easement of access, light,
195	air, or view.
196	[(33)] (34) "Local highway authority" means the legislative, executive, or governing
197	body of a county, municipal, or other local board or body having authority to enact laws
198	relating to traffic under the constitution and laws of the state.
199	[(34)] (35) (a) "Low-speed vehicle" means a four wheeled electric motor vehicle that:
200	(i) is designed to be operated at speeds of not more than 25 miles per hour; and
201	(ii) has a capacity of not more than six passengers, including a conventional driver or
202	fallback-ready user if on board the vehicle, as those terms are defined in Section 41-26-102.1.
203	(b) "Low-speed vehicle" does not include a golfcart or an off-highway vehicle.
204	[(35)] (36) "Metal tire" means a tire, the surface of which in contact with the highway
205	is wholly or partly of metal or other hard nonresilient material.
206	[(36)] (37) (a) "Mini-motorcycle" means a motorcycle or motor-driven cycle that has a
207	seat or saddle that is less than 24 inches from the ground as measured on a level surface with
208	properly inflated tires.
209	(b) "Mini-motorcycle" does not include a moped or a motor assisted scooter.
210	(c) "Mini-motorcycle" does not include a motorcycle that is:
211	(i) designed for off-highway use; and

212	(11) registered as an off-highway vehicle under Section 41-22-3.

308	[(54)] (55) "Railroad" means a carrier of persons or property upon cars operated on
309	stationary rails.
310	[(55)] (56) "Railroad sign or signal" means a sign, signal, or device erected by
311	authority of a public body or official or by a railroad and intended to give notice of the presence
312	of railroad tracks or the approach of a railroad train.
313	[(56)] (57) "Railroad train" means a locomotive propelled by any form of energy,
314	coupled with or operated without cars, and operated upon rails.
315	[(57)] (58) "Right-of-way" means the right of one vehicle or pedestrian to proceed in a
316	lawful manner in preference to another vehicle or pedestrian approaching under circumstances
317	of direction, speed, and proximity that give rise to danger of collision unless one grants
318	precedence to the other.
319	[(58)] (59) (a) "Roadway" means that portion of highway improved, designed, or
320	ordinarily used for vehicular travel.
321	(b) "Roadway" does not include the sidewalk, berm, or shoulder, even though any of
322	them are used by persons riding bicycles or other human-powered vehicles.
323	(c) "Roadway" refers to any roadway separately but not to all roadways collectively, if
324	a highway includes two or more separate roadways.
325	[(59)] (60) "Safety zone" means the area or space officially set apart within a roadway
326	for the exclusive use of pedestrians and that is protected, marked, or indicated by adequate
327	signs as to be plainly visible at all times while set apart as a safety zone.
328	[(60)] (61) (a) "School bus" means a motor vehicle that:
329	(i) complies with the color and identification requirements of the most recent edition of
330	"Minimum Standards for School Buses"; and
331	(ii) is used to transport school children to or from school or school activities.
332	(b) "School bus" does not include a vehicle operated by a common carrier in
333	transportation of school children to or from school or school activities.

357	(b) in compliance with the directions of a peace officer or traffic-control device.
358	[(68)] (69) "Street-legal all-terrain vehicle" or "street-legal ATV" means an all-terrain
359	type I vehicle, all-terrain type II vehicle, or all-terrain type III vehicle, that is modified to meet
360	the requirements of Section 41-6a-1509 to operate on highways in the state in accordance with
361	Section 41-6a-1509.
362	[(69)] (70) "Traffic" means pedestrians, ridden or herded animals, vehicles, and other
363	conveyances either singly or together while using any highway for the purpose of travel.
364	[(70)] (71) "Traffic signal preemption device" means an instrument or mechanism
365	designed, intended, or used to interfere with the operation or cycle of a traffic-control signal.
366	[ <del>(71)</del> ] (72) "Traffic-control device" means a sign, signal, marking, or device not

367	inconsistent with this chapter placed or erected by a highway authority for the purpose of
368	regulating, warning, or guiding traffic.
369	[ <del>(72)</del> ] <u>(73)</u> "Traffic-control signal" means a device, whether manually, electrically, or
370	mechanically operated, by which traffic is alternately directed to stop and permitted to proceed

395	to the provisions under this chapter for a bicycle.
396	(2) (a) [An] Except as provided in Subsection (2)(b), an individual may operate an
397	electric assisted bicycle on a path or trail designated for the use of a bicycle.

- (b) Except as provided in Subsection (2)(c), an individual may not operate an electric assisted bicycle other than a class 1 electric assisted mountain bicycle on a dirt trail.
  - (c) (i) In accordance with Section 41-6a-1115.6, an individual with a cycling disability and with a valid trail accessibility card may operate an class 1 electric assisted mountain bicycle on any path or trail designated for the use of a bicycle.
  - (ii) In accordance with Section 41-6a-1115.6, an individual with a walking disability and with a valid trail accessibility card may operate an electric assisted bicycle on any path or trail designated for the use of a bicycle.
