28	Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:
29	Section 1. Section 36-29-109 is enacted to read:
30	<u>36-29-109.</u> Utah Advanced Air Mobility Task Force.
31	(1) There is created the Utah Advanced Air Mobility Task Force consisting of the
32	following 14 members:
33	(a) the following five voting members:
34	(i) two members of the Senate, appointed by the president of the Senate; and
35	(ii) three members of the House of Representatives, appointed by the speaker of the
36	House of Representatives; and
37	(b) the following nine non-voting members:
38	(i) a representative of the advanced air mobility industry, appointed by the president of
39	the Senate;
40	(ii) a representative of the advanced air mobility industry, appointed by the speaker of
41	the House of Representatives;
42	(iii) the executive director of the department or the executive director's designee;
43	(iv) the commissioner of the Department of Public Safety or the commissioner's
44	designee;
45	(v) a representative of the Utah League of Cities and Towns, appointed by the
46	governor;
47	(vi) a representative of the Utah Association of Counties, appointed by the governor;
48	(vii) two representatives of the business community, appointed by the governor; and
49	(viii) a representative of a state institution of higher education, appointed by the
50	governor.
51	(2) The task force shall study current laws in the state and identify potential changes to
52	state law necessary to facilitate the development of advanced air mobility operations in the
53	state.
54	(3) The task force may select from the voting task force members appointed under
55	Subsection (1) the chair of the task force.
56	(4) (a) If a vacancy occurs in the membership of the task force appointed under
57	Subsection (1), the member shall be replaced in the same manner in which the original
58	appointment was made.

59	(b) A member appointed under Subsection (1) serves until the member's successor is
60	appointed.
61	(5) (a) A majority of the voting members of the task force constitutes a quorum.
62	(b) The action of a majority of a quorum constitutes an action of the task force.
63	(6) (a) The salary and expenses of a task force member who is a legislator shall be paid
64	in accordance with Section 36-2-2 and Legislative Joint Rules, Title 5, Legislative
65	Compensation and Expenses.
66	(b) A task force member who is not a legislator may not receive compensation or
67	benefits for the member's service on the task force, but may receive per diem and
68	reimbursement for travel expenses incurred as a task force member at the rates established by
69	the Division of Finance under:
70	(i) Sections 63A-3-106 and 63A-3-107; and
71	(ii) rules made by the Division of Finance under Sections 63A-3-106 and 63A-3-107.
72	(7) The Office of Legislative Research and General Counsel shall provide staff support
73	to the task force.
74	(8) On or before September 30, 2022, the task force shall report the task force's
75	findings and recommendations to the Transportation Interim Committee.
76	(9) On or before December 1, 2022, the Transportation Interim Committee shall:
77	(a) study:
78	(i) the findings and recommendations of the task force; and
79	(ii) the findings of the department for development and implementation of advanced air
80	mobility in the state as required under Subsection 72-1-216.1(1)(b); and
81	(b) prepare any legislation based on the findings and recommendations described in
82	Subsection (9)(a) for consideration by the Legislature in the next general session.

96	(b) "Unmanned aircraft system" means the same as that term is defined in Section
97	<u>72-14-102.</u>
98	(2) An actor may be found guilty of an offense if:
99	(a) the actor commits the offense with the aid of an unmanned aircraft; and
100	(b) the unmanned aircraft system for the unmanned aircraft is under the actor's control
101	at the time of the offense.
