

Senator Jacob L. Anderegg proposes the following substitute bill:

**CRIMINAL JUSTICE DATA MANAGEMENT TASK FORCE**

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**LONG TITLE**

**General Description:**

This bill creates the Criminal Justice Data Management Task Force.

**Highlighted Provisions:**

This bill:

- ▶ creates the Criminal Justice Data Management Task Force;
- ▶ defines membership;
- ▶ sets out the task force's responsibilities; and
- ▶ sets a sunset date.

**Money Appropriated in this Bill:**

This bill appropriates in fiscal year 2023:

- ▶ to the Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice -- CCJJ Commission:
  - from General Fund -- \$170,000;
  - from General Fund, One-time -- \$50,000.

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29 *Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:*

30 Section 1. Section **36-29-109** is enacted to read:

31 **36-29-109. Criminal Justice Data Management Task Force.**

32 (1) As used in this section, "task force" means the Criminal Justice Data Management  
33 Task Force created in this section.

34 (2) There is created the Criminal Justice Data Management Task Force consisting of  
35 the following members:

36 (a) three members of the Senate appointed by the president of the Senate, no more than  
37 two of whom may be from the same political party;

38 (b) three members of the House of Representatives appointed by the speaker of the  
39 House of Representatives, no more than two of whom may be from the same political party;

40 and

41 (c) representatives from the following organizations as requested by the executive  
42 director of the Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice:

43 (i) the Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice;

44 (ii) the Office of the Utah Attorney General;

45 (iii) the Judicial Council;

46 (iv) the Statewide Association of Prosecutors;

47 (v) the Department of Corrections;

48 (vi) the Department of Public Safety;

49 (vii) the Utah League of Cities and Towns;

50 (viii) the Utah Association of Counties;

51 (ix) the Utah Chiefs of Police Association;

52 (x) the Utah Sheriffs Association;

53 (xi) the Board of Pardons and Parole; and

54 (xii) any other organizations or groups as recommended by the executive director of  
55 the Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice.

56 (3) (a) The president of the Senate shall designate a member of the Senate appointed

57 under Subsection (2)(a) as a cochair of the task force.

58 (b) The speaker of the House of Representatives shall designate a member of the House  
59 of Representatives appointed under Subsection (2)(b) as a cochair of the task force.

60 (4) (a) A majority of the members of the task force present at a meeting constitutes a  
61 quorum.

62 (b) The action of a majority of a quorum constitutes an action of the task force.

63 (5) (a) Salaries and expenses of the members of the task force who are legislators shall  
64 be paid in accordance with Section [36-2-2](#) and Legislative Joint Rules, Title 5, Chapter 3,  
65 Legislator Compensation.

66 (b) A member of the task force who is not a legislator:

67 (i) may not receive compensation for the member's work associated with the task force;  
68 and

69 (ii) may receive per diem and reimbursement for travel expenses incurred as a member  
70 of the task force at the rates established by the Division of Finance under Sections [63A-3-106](#)  
71 and [63A-3-107](#).

72 (6) The Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice shall provide staff support to the  
73 task force.

74 (7) The task force shall review the state's current criminal justice data collection  
75 requirements and make recommendations regarding:

76 (a) ways to automate the collection, storage, and dissemination of the data;

77 (b) standardizing the format of data collection and retention; and

78 (c) the collection of data not already required related to criminal justice.

79 (8) On or before November 30, 2022, the task force shall provide a report, including  
80 any proposed legislation, to:

81 (a) the Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice Interim Committee; and

82 (b) the Legislative Management Committee.

83 (9) The task force is repealed April 30, 2023.

84 Section 2. Section **63I-2-236** is amended to read:

85 **63I-2-236. Repeal dates -- Title 36.**

86 (1) Section [36-29-107.5](#) is repealed on November 30, 2023.

87 (2) Section [36-29-109](#) is repealed April 30, 2023.

89 January 1, 2024:

93 Section 3. **Appropriation.**

94 The following sums of money are appropriated for the fiscal year beginning July 1,  
95 2022, and ending June 30, 2023. These are additions to amounts previously appropriated for  
96 fiscal year 2023. Under the terms and conditions of Title 63J, Chapter 1, Budgetary Procedures  
97 Act, the Legislature appropriates the following sums of money from the funds or accounts  
98 indicated for the use and support of the government of the state of Utah.
