Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:

Section 1. Section **76-2-310** is enacted to read:

<u>76-2-310.</u> Limitation of defense based on victim's sexual orientation or gender identity.

- (1) As used in this section:
- (a) "Gender identity" means the {actual or perceived gender-related identity, expression, appearance, behavior, or other gender-related characteristic of an individual, regardless of the individual's physiology or assigned sex at birth} same as that term is defined in Section 34A-5-102.
- (b) "Sexual orientation" means {an individual's actual or perceived heterosexuality, homosexuality, or bisexuality} the same as that term is defined in Section 34A-5-102.
- (2) An actor may not use the actor's perception or misperception of a victim's sexual orientation or gender identity, including the actor's perception or misperception of a nonviolent romantic or sexual advance made by a victim toward the actor:
 - (a) to defend, excuse, or justify the actor's conduct in committing a criminal offense; or
 - (b) to mitigate the severity of or sentence for the actor's criminal offense.
