27	Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:
28	Section 1. Section 53G-4-414 is enacted to read:
29	53G-4-414. Recognized cultural or religious adornment at high school graduation
30	ceremonies.
31	(1) As used in this section:
32	(a) "Adornment" means something that a student attaches to, or wears with, but does
33	not replace, graduation attire.
34	(b) "Cultural" means recognized practices and traditions of a certain group of people.
35	(c) "Graduation attire" means attire that an LEA requires a student to wear as part of
36	the dress code for a graduation ceremony.
37	(d) "Graduation ceremony" means a high school graduation ceremony.
38	(2) A student may wear recognized items of cultural or religious significance as an
39	adornment at a graduation ceremony.
40	(3) Notwithstanding Subsection (2), an LEA may prohibit a student from wearing an
41	item of adornment:
42	(a) that is likely to cause a substantial disruption of, or material interference with, the
43	graduation ceremony; and
44	(b) if an LEA uses the least restrictive means necessary to accomplish a specifically
45	identified compelling governmental interest.
46	(4) Nothing in this section limits an LEA's authority related to student expression under
47	applicable federal and state law.
48	(5) Nothing in this section limits or impairs the rights of a qualifying student under
49	Section 53G-4-412 to wear tribal regalia to a graduation ceremony.
