53	(1) As used in this section, "task force" means the Justice Court Reform Task Force
54	created in Subsection (2).
55	(2) There is created the Justice Court Reform Task Force consisting of the following
56	members:
57	(a) three members of the Senate appointed by the president of the Senate, no more than

322	serve on committees or boards or to complete assignments, including responding to search
323	warrant requests.

327	(c) The municipality or county shall consider a request under Subsection (5)(a) to be
