General Description:
This bill amends provisions related to the Special Needs Opportunity Scholarship
Program.
Highlighted Provisions:
This bill:
 modifies defined terms;
 expands the expenses for which a scholarship recipient may use a scholarship
award;
 amends the formula for calculating a scholarship amount for an eligible student;
 allows a scholarship granting organization to prorate a scholarship award under
certain circumstances;
 increases the amount of donations a scholarship granting organization may carry
forward in a fiscal year; and
 makes technical changes.

33	Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:
34	Section 1. Section 53E-7-401 is amended to read:
35	53E-7-401. Definitions.
36	As used in this part:
37	(1) "Eligible student" means:
38	(a) a student who:
39	(i) is eligible to participate in public school, in kindergarten or grades 1 through 12;
40	(ii) is a resident of the state;
41	(iii) (A) has an IEP; or
42	(B) is determined by a multidisciplinary evaluation team to be eligible for services
43	under 20 U.S.C. Sec. 1401(3); and
44	(iv) during the school year for which the student is applying for the scholarship, is not:
45	(A) a student who receives a scholarship under the Carson Smith Scholarship Program
46	created in Section 53F-4-302; or
47	(B) <u>enrolled as</u> a public school student; or
48	(b) a student who:
49	(i) meets the requirement of Subsections (1)(a)(i) and (ii); and
50	(ii) is a sibling of and resides in the same household as a student described in
51	Subsection (1)(a) if:
52	(A) the student described in Subsection (1)(a) is a scholarship student and has verified
53	enrollment or intent to enroll at a qualifying school; and
54	(B) the sibling is applying for a scholarship to attend the same qualifying school.
55	(2) (a) "Employee" means an individual working in a position in which the individual's
56	salary, wages, pay, or compensation, including as a contractor, is paid from:
57	(i) program donations to a scholarship granting organization; or
58	(ii) scholarship money allocated to a qualifying school by a scholarship granting

59	organization under Section 53E-7-405.
60	(b) "Employee" does not include an individual who volunteers at the scholarship
61	granting organization or qualifying school.
62	(3) "Family income" means the annual income of the parent, parents, legal guardian, or
63	legal guardians with whom a scholarship student lives.
64	(4) "Federal poverty level" means the poverty level as defined by the most recently
65	revised poverty income guidelines published by the United States Department of Health and
66	Human Services in the Federal Register.
67	(5) "Multidisciplinary evaluation team" means two or more individuals:
68	(a) who are qualified in two or more separate disciplines or professions; and
69	(b) who evaluate a child.
70	(6) "Officer" means:
71	(a) a member of the board of a scholarship granting organization or qualifying school;
72	or
73	(b) the chief administrative officer of a scholarship granting organization or qualifying
74	school.
75	(7) "Program donation" means a donation to the program under Section $53E-7-405$.
76	(8) "Qualifying school" means a private school that:
77	(a) provides kindergarten, elementary, or secondary education;
78	(b) is approved by the state board under Section $53E-7-408$; and
79	(c) meets the requirements described in Section 53E-7-403.
80	(9) "Relative" means a father, mother, husband, wife, son, daughter, sister, brother,
81	uncle, aunt, nephew, niece, first cousin, mother-in-law, father-in-law, brother-in-law,
82	sister-in-law, son-in-law, or daughter-in-law.
83	(10) "Scholarship" means a grant awarded to an eligible student:
84	(a) by a scholarship granting organization out of program donations; and
85	(b) for the purpose of paying for a scholarship expense.
86	[(11) "Scholarship expense" means:]
87	[(a) tuition, fees, or textbooks for a qualifying school;]
88	[(b) educational therapy, if the educational therapy is provided by a licensed physician
89	or licensed practitioner, including occupational, behavioral, physical, or speech-language

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90	therapies;]
91	[(c) textbooks, curriculum, or other instructional materials, including supplemental
92	materials or associated online instruction required by a curriculum;]
93	[(d) tuition and fees for an online learning course or program; or]
94	[(e) fees associated with a state-recognized industry certification examination or any
95	examination related to college or university admission.]
96	(11) "Scholarship expense" means an expense that a parent or eligible student incurs in
97	the education of the eligible student for goods or a service that a qualifying school provides or
98	facilitates, including:
99	(a) tuition and fees of a qualifying school;
100	(b) fees and instructional materials at a technical college;
101	(c) tutoring services;
102	(d) fees for after-school or summer education programs;
103	(e) textbooks, curricula, or other instructional materials, including any supplemental
104	materials or associated online instruction that a curriculum or a qualifying school recommends;
105	(f) educational software and applications;
106	(g) supplies or other equipment related to an eligible student's educational needs;
107	(h) computer hardware or other technological devices that are intended primarily for an
108	eligible student's educational needs;
109	(i) fees for the following examinations, or for a preparation course for the following
110	examinations, that the scholarship granting organization approves:
111	(i) a national norm-referenced or standardized assessment described in Section
112	53F-6-410, an advanced placement examination, or another similar assessment;
113	(ii) a state-recognized industry certification examination; and
114	(iii) an examination related to college or university admission;
115	(j) educational services for students with disabilities from a licensed or accredited
116	practitioner or provider, including occupational, behavioral, physical, audiology, or
117	speech-language therapies;
118	(k) contracted services that the scholarship granting organization approves and that an
119	LEA provides, including individual classes, after-school tutoring services, transportation, or
120	fees or costs associated with participation in extracurricular activities;

121	(1) ride fees or fares for a fee-for-service transportation provider to transport the
122	scholarship student to and from a qualifying school, not to exceed \$750 in a given school year;
123	(m) expenses related to extra curricular activities, field trips, educational supplements,
124	and other educational experiences; or
125	(n) the scholarship granting organization approves in accordance with Subsection
126	<u>53E-7-405(3).</u>
127	(12) "Scholarship granting organization" means an organization that is:
128	(a) qualified as tax exempt under Section 501(c)(3), Internal Revenue Code; and
129	(b) recognized through an agreement with the state board as a scholarship granting
130	organization, as described in Section 53E-7-404.
131	(13) "Scholarship student" means an eligible student who receives a scholarship under
132	this part.
133	(14) "Special Needs Opportunity Scholarship Program" or "program" means the
134	program established in Section 53E-7-402.
135	(15) "Value of the weighted pupil unit" means the amount established each year in the
136	enacted public education budget that is multiplied by the number of weighted pupil units to
137	yield the funding level for the basic state-supported school program.
138	Section 2. Section 53E-7-402 is amended to read:
139	53E-7-402. Special Needs Opportunity Scholarship Program.
140	(1) There is established the Special Needs Opportunity Scholarship Program under
141	which a parent may apply to a scholarship granting organization on behalf of the parent's
142	student for a scholarship to help cover the cost of a scholarship expense.
143	(2) (a) A scholarship granting organization shall[$:$ (i)] award, in accordance with this
144	part, scholarships to eligible students[; and].
145	[(ii) determine the amount of a scholarship in accordance with Subsection (3).]
146	(b) In awarding scholarships, a scholarship granting organization shall give priority to
147	an eligible student described in Subsection 53E-7-401(1)(a) by:
148	(i) establishing an August 10 deadline for an eligible student described in Subsection
149	53E-7-401(1)(b) to apply for a scholarship; and
150	(ii) awarding a scholarship to an eligible student described in Subsection
151	53E-7-401(1)(b) only if funds exist after awarding scholarships to all eligible students

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152	described in Subsection $53E-7-401(1)(a)$ who have applied and qualify.
153	(c) Subject to available funds, a scholarship awarded to an eligible student described in
154	Subsection 53E-7-401(1)(b) shall be for a similar term as a scholarship awarded to the eligible
155	student's sibling.
156	[(3) A scholarship granting organization shall determine a full-year scholarship award
157	to pay for the cost of one or more scholarship expenses in an amount not more than:]
158	[(a) for an eligible student described in Subsection 53E-7-401(1)(a) who is:]
159	[(i) in grades 1 through 12 with an IEP and whose family income is:]
160	[(A) at or below 185% of the federal poverty level, the value of the weighted pupil unit
161	multiplied by 2.5;]
162	[(B) between 185% and 555% of the federal poverty level, the value of the weighted
163	pupil unit multiplied by two; or]
164	[(C) above 555% of the federal poverty level, the value of the weighted pupil unit
165	multiplied by 1.5;]
166	[(ii) in grades 1 through 12 and who does not have an IEP, the value of the weighted
167	pupil unit;]
168	[(iii) in kindergarten with an IEP, the value of the weighted pupil unit; or]
169	[(iv) in kindergarten and who does not have an IEP, half the value of the weighted
170	pupil unit; or]
171	[(b) for an eligible student described in Subsection 53E-7-401(1)(b), half the value of
172	the weighted pupil unit.]
173	(3) (a) Beginning with the 2022-23 school year, no later than July 31 after each school
174	year, the state auditor shall publish the average LEA spending for a student who has an IEP or
175	is determined by a multidisciplinary evaluation team to be eligible for services under 20 U.S.C.
176	<u>Sec. 1401(3).</u>
177	(b) The state auditor shall calculate the average spending described in Subsection (3)(a)
178	by averaging the direct and indirect costs of educational and student support services provided
179	to a student who has an IEP or is determined by a multidisciplinary evaluation team to be
180	eligible for services under 20 U.S.C. Sec. 1401(3).
181	(4) Beginning with the 2023-24 school year, a scholarship granting organization:
182	(a) shall grant each full-year scholarship award in an amount equal to the amount

183	calculated under Subsection (3); and
184	(b) may prorate the amount of a scholarship award for a student who becomes an
185	eligible student during the school year.
186	[(4)] (5) Eligibility for a scholarship as determined by a multidisciplinary evaluation
187	team under this program does not establish eligibility for an IEP under the Individuals with
188	Disabilities Education Act, Subchapter II, 20 U.S.C. Secs. 1400 to 1419, and is not binding on
189	any LEA that is required to provide an IEP under the Individuals with Disabilities Education
190	Act.
191	[(5)] (6) The scholarship granting organizations shall prepare and disseminate
192	information on the program to a parent applying for a scholarship on behalf of a student.
193	Section 3. Section 53E-7-405 is amended to read:
194	53E-7-405. Program donations Scholarship granting organization
195	requirements.
196	(1) A person that makes a donation to a scholarship granting organization to help fund
197	scholarships through the program may be eligible to receive a nonrefundable tax credit as
198	described in Sections 59-7-625 and 59-10-1041.
199	(2) In accordance with Section $53E-7-404$, an organization may enter into an
200	agreement with the state board to be a scholarship granting organization.
201	(3) A scholarship granting organization shall:
202	(a) accept program donations and allow a person that makes a program donation to
203	designate a qualifying school to which the donation shall be directed for scholarships;
204	(b) adopt an application process in accordance with Subsection (5);
205	(c) review scholarship applications and determine scholarship awards;
206	(d) allocate scholarship money to a scholarship student's parent or, on the parent's
207	behalf, to a qualifying school in which the scholarship student is enrolled;
208	(e) adopt a process, with state board approval, that allows a parent to use a scholarship
209	to pay for a nontuition scholarship expense for the scholarship student;
210	(f) ensure that during the state fiscal year:
211	(i) at least 92% of the scholarship granting organization's revenue from program
212	donations is spent on scholarships;
213	(ii) up to 5% of the scholarship granting organization's revenue from program

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214 donations is spent on administration of the program; 215 (iii) up to 3% of the scholarship granting organization's revenue from program 216 donations is spent on marketing and fundraising costs; and 217 (iv) all revenue from program donations' interest or investments is spent on 218 scholarships; 219 (g) carry forward no more than [40] 60% of the scholarship granting organization's 220 program donations, less funds for a scholarship that has been awarded, and funds expended for 221 administration and marketing, from the state fiscal year in which the scholarship granting 222 organization received the program donations to the following state fiscal year; 223 (h) at the end of a state fiscal year, remit to the state treasurer donation amounts greater 224 than the amount described in Subsection (3)(g); 225 (i) prohibit a scholarship granting organization employee or officer from handling, 226 managing, or processing program donations, if, based on a criminal background check conducted by the state board in accordance with Section 53E-7-404, the state board identifies 227 228 the employee or officer as posing a risk to the appropriate use of program donations; 229 (i) ensure that a scholarship can be transferred during the school year to a different 230 qualifying school that accepts the scholarship student; 231 (k) report to the state board on or before October 1 of each year the following 232 information, prepared by a certified public accountant: 233 (i) the name and address of the scholarship granting organization; 234 (ii) the total number and total dollar amount of program donations that the scholarship 235 granting organization received during the previous calendar year; 236 (iii) (A) the total number and total dollar amount of scholarships the scholarship 237 granting organization awarded during the previous state fiscal year to eligible students 238 described in Subsection 53E-7-401(1)(a); and 239 (B) the total number and total dollar amount of scholarships the scholarship granting 240 organization awarded during the previous state fiscal year to eligible students described in 241 Subsection 53E-7-401(1)(b); and 242 (iv) the percentage of first-time scholarship recipients who were enrolled in a public 243 school during the previous school year or who entered kindergarten or a higher grade for the 244 first time in Utah;

245	(1) issue tax credit certificates as described in Section 53E-7-407; and
246	(m) require a parent to notify a scholarship granting organization if the parent's
247	scholarship recipient:
248	(i) receives scholarship money for tuition expenses; and
249	(ii) does not have continuing enrollment and attendance at a qualifying school.
250	(4) The state treasurer shall deposit the money described in Subsection (3)(h) into the
251	Income Tax Fund.
252	(5) (a) An application for a scholarship shall contain an acknowledgment by the
253	applicant's parent that the qualifying school selected by the parent for the applicant to attend
254	using a scholarship is capable of providing the level of disability services required for the
255	student.
256	(b) A scholarship application form shall contain the following statement:
257	"I acknowledge that:
258	(1) A private school may not provide the same level of disability services that are
259	provided in a public school;
260	(2) I will assume full financial responsibility for the education of my scholarship
261	recipient if I accept this scholarship;
262	(3) Acceptance of this scholarship has the same effect as a parental refusal to consent
263	to services as described in 24 C.F.R. Sec. 300.300, issued under the Individuals with
264	Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C. Sec. 1400 et seq.; and
265	(4) My child may return to a public school at any time."
266	(c) Upon acceptance of a scholarship, the parent assumes full financial responsibility
267	for the education of the scholarship recipient.
268	(d) Acceptance of a scholarship has the same effect as a parental refusal to consent to
269	services as described in 24 C.F.R. Sec. 300.300, issued under the Individuals with Disabilities
270	Education Act, 20 U.S.C. Sec. 1400 et seq.
271	(e) The creation of the program or granting of a scholarship does not:
272	(i) imply that a public school did not provide a free and appropriate public education
273	for a student; or
274	(ii) constitute a waiver or admission by the state.
275	(6) A scholarship granting organization shall demonstrate the scholarship granting

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276	organization's financial accountability by annually submitting to the state board a financial
277	information report that:
278	(a) complies with the uniform financial accounting standards described in Section
279	53E-7-404; and
280	(b) is prepared by a certified public accountant.
281	(7) (a) If a scholarship granting organization allocates \$500,000 or more in
282	scholarships annually through the program, the scholarship granting organization shall:
283	(i) contract for an annual audit, conducted by a certified public accountant who is
284	independent from:
285	(A) the scholarship granting organization; and
286	(B) the scholarship granting organization's accounts and records pertaining to program
287	donations; and
288	(ii) in accordance with Subsection (7)(b), report the results of the audit to the state
289	board for review.
290	(b) For the report described in Subsection (7)(a)(ii), the scholarship granting
291	organization shall:
292	(i) include the scholarship granting organization's financial statements in a format that
293	meets generally accepted accounting standards; and
294	(ii) submit the report to the state board no later than 180 days after the last day of a
295	scholarship granting organization's fiscal year.
296	(c) The certified public accountant shall conduct an audit described in Subsection
297	(7)(a)(i) in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and rules made by the state
298	board.
299	(d) (i) The state board shall review a report submitted under this section and may
300	request that the scholarship granting organization revise or supplement the report if the report
301	is not in compliance with the provisions of this Subsection (7) or rules adopted by the state
302	board.
303	(ii) A scholarship granting organization shall provide a revised report or supplement to
304	the report no later than 45 days after the day on which the state board makes a request
305	described in Subsection (7)(d)(i).
306	(8) (a) A scholarship granting organization may not allocate scholarship money to a

307	qualifying school if:
308	(i) the scholarship granting organization determines that the qualifying school
309	intentionally or substantially misrepresented information on overpayment;
310	(ii) the qualifying school fails to refund an overpayment in a timely manner; or
311	(iii) the qualifying school routinely fails to provide scholarship recipients with
312	promised educational goods or services.
313	(b) A scholarship granting organization shall notify a scholarship recipient if the
314	scholarship granting organization stops allocation of the recipient's scholarship money to a
315	qualifying school under Subsection (8)(a).
316	(9) If a scholarship recipient transfers to another qualifying school during the school
317	year, the scholarship granting organization may prorate scholarship money between the
318	qualifying schools according to the time the scholarship recipient spends at each school.
319	(10) A scholarship granting organization may not:
320	(a) award a scholarship to a relative of the scholarship granting organization's officer or
321	employee; or
322	(b) allocate scholarship money to a qualifying school at which the scholarship recipient
323	has a relative who is an officer or an employee of the qualifying school.
