## **General Description:**

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the state of Utah:

<u>WHEREAS</u>, support for term limits on members of Congress is one of the most popular bipartisan voter initiatives, with a January 2023 poll showing that over 82% of Americans support a constitutional amendment that will place term limits on members of Congress;

WHEREAS, the current re-election rate in Congress is over 90%, with nearly one-half of the members of Congress having served in office for more than eight years, and a quarter of the members of Congress having served in office for more than 16 years;

WHEREAS, national efforts to address the problems associated with career politicians and incumbency are incomplete without also addressing the problems associated with the accumulation of power by unelected bureaucrats in the legislative and executive branches of the federal government;

WHEREAS, studies have shown that term limits have increased legislative diversity, and have had a statistically significant, positive impact on increasing women's representation in legislatures, and would also address the top-down power structure in Washington D.C. by allowing less-senior members to hold leadership roles;

WHEREAS, Article V of the United States Constitution provides that "on the application of the legislatures of two thirds of the several states, [Congress] shall call a convention for proposing amendments...to this Constitution":

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of the state of Utah hereby makes an application to Congress, as provided by Article V of the {Constitution of the }United States {of America}Constitution, to call a convention limited to proposing an amendment to the {Constitution of the }United States {of America}Constitution to set a limit

on the number of terms that a person may be elected as a member of the United States House of Representatives and to set a limit to the number of terms that a person may be elected as a member of the United States Senate.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution shall be considered as covering the same subject matter as the applications from other states to Congress to call a convention to set a limit on the number of terms that a person may be elected as a member of the United States House of Representatives and the United States Senate and shall be aggregated with the same for the purpose of attaining the two-thirds of states necessary to require Congress to call a limited convention on this subject, but shall not be aggregated with any other applications on any other subject.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution constitutes a continuing application in accordance with Article V of the United States Constitution until the legislatures of at least two-thirds of the several states have made applications on the same subject.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, in addition to, and separately from, the above resolution clauses, the Legislature of the state of Utah hereby makes an application to

Congress, as provided by Article V of the United States Constitution, to call a convention limited to proposing an amendment to the United States Constitution to set a limit on the length of time unelected bureaucrats in the legislative and executive branches of the federal government.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this separate application shall be considered as covering the same subject matter as the applications from other states to Congress to call a convention to set a limit on the length of time unelected bureaucrats in the legislative and executive branches of the federal government may work for the legislative and executive branches of the federal government and shall be aggregated with the same for the purpose of attaining the two-thirds of states necessary to require Congress to call a limited convention on this subject, but shall not be aggregated with any other applications on any other subject.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this separate application constitutes a continuing application in accordance with Article V of the United States Constitution until the legislatures of at least two-thirds of the several states have made applications on the same subject.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to the Majority Leader and Secretary of the United States Senate, the Speaker, Clerk, and Judiciary Chairman

of the United States House of Representatives, the members of Utah's congressional delegation, and the presiding officers of each of the legislative houses in the several states, requesting their cooperation.
