7	LONG TITLE
8	General Description:
9	This bill enacts a public safety officer scholarship program for high school students
10	entering into a law enforcement career.
11	Highlighted Provisions:
12	This bill:
13	► defines terms;
14	creates a public safety officer scholarship program for high school graduates who:
15	 enroll in a law enforcement agency cadet program;
16	 seek a degree program in higher education; and
17	 after Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) certification, commit to a
18	peace officer career of a certain minimum duration;
19	establishes application and work requirement processes;
20	 allows for institutions of higher education to determine participation in the program;
21	 requires a scholarship recipient to report certification and employment statuses to
22	the Utah Board of Higher Education (board);
23	 requires the POST Division to report employment status changes to the board;
24	 provides for repayment of scholarship funds in the case of a failure to meet program
25	requirements;
26	grants the board rulemaking authority;
27	 amends board requirements to create a pathway plan for high school students



interested in law enforcement; and	
 makes technical and conforming changes.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:	
Section 1. Section 53-6-209 is amended to read:	
53-6-209. Termination of employment Change of status form.	
(1) When a peace officer's employment terminates, the employing agency shall submit	
a change of status form noting the termination of the peace officer to the division.	
(2) The change of status form shall:	
(a) be completed and submitted within 30 days [of the peace officer's termination date]	
after the day on which the peace officer's employment terminates;	
(b) identify the circumstances of the peace officer's status change by indicating that the	
peace officer has resigned, retired, terminated, transferred, is deceased, or that the peace	
officer's name has changed;	
(c) indicate the effective date of action; and	
(d) indicate the name of the new employer, if the status change is due to a transfer.	
(3) If a peace officer's employment terminates during an open internal investigation	
regarding that peace officer and involving an alleged violation of Subsection 53-6-211(1), the	
employing agency shall:	
(a) notify the division of the investigation in accordance with Subsection 53-6-211(6)	

59	within 30 days [of the peace officer's termination date] after the day on which the peace
60	officer's employment terminates and
61	(b) provide a reasonable estimated date of completion for the investigation.
62	(4) (a) If an employing agency receives credible allegations and opens an internal
63	investigation within two years after [a peace officer's employment has been terminated] the day
64	on which a peace officer's employment terminates, the employing agency shall:
65	(i) notify the division within 30 days [of the date of the opening of the] after the day on
66	which the employing agency opens the investigation; and
67	(ii) provide a reasonable estimated date of completion for the investigation.
68	(b) If the allegations described in Subsection (4)(a) involve alleged violations of
69	Subsection 53-6-211(1), the agency shall report the allegations to the division in accordance
70	with Subsection 53-6-211(6), regardless of whether [or not] the employing agency opens an
71	internal investigation.
72	(5) Any person or agency who intentionally falsifies, misrepresents, or fails to give
73	notice of the change of status of a peace officer is liable to the division for any damages that
74	[may be sustained by] the failure to make the notification[-] causes. The division shall provide
75	the change of status form described in this section to the Utah Board of Higher Education
76	within 30 days after the day on which the division receives a notice of termination if the
77	relevant peace officer has received a Public Safety Officer Scholarship as described in Section
78	<u>53B-8-112.5.</u>
79	Section 2. Section 53B-8-112 is amended to read:

81	(1) [The] This section creates the Public Safety Officer Career Advancement Grant
82	Program [is created].
83	(2) Subject to legislative appropriations and Subsection [(6)] (7), the board shall award
84	a grant to an applicant who:
85	(a) is a certified peace officer, currently employed by a law enforcement agency within
86	the state; and
87	(b) is seeking a post-secondary degree in the area of criminal justice from a
88	[credit-granting higher education institution] degree-granting institution of higher education
89	within the state system of higher education, described in Section 53B-1-102.

90	(3) (a) Subject to Subsection (3)(b), the board may award a qualified applicant up to
91	the cost of tuition and fees.
92	(b) A grant award under Subsection (3)(a) is limited to:
93	(i) a maximum of \$5,000 each academic year; and
94	(ii) a maximum of four academic years.
95	(4) The board shall design the program to [use a packaging approach that ensures]
96	ensure that institutions combine loans, grants, employment, and family and individual
97	contributions toward financing the cost of attendance.
98	(5) Notwithstanding Subsection (4), the board may not award a scholarship described

112	section is insufficient to cover the costs associated with the Public Safety Officer Career

145	(4) (a) The board shall determine the amount of a scholarship award, ensuring that the
146	amount does not exceed the combined cost of tuition, fees, and required textbooks.
147	(b) A scholarship award described in Subsection (4)(a) is limited to:
148	(i) POST training and certification in accordance with Title 53, Chapter 6, Peace
149	Officer Standards and Training Act; and
150	(ii) a maximum of four academic years in a post-secondary degree program.
151	(5) The board shall design the scholarship program to ensure that participating

152	institutions combine state or federal loans or grants, internships, student employment, and
153	family and individual contributions toward financing the cost of attendance.
154	(6) A scholarship recipient shall:
155	(a) notify the board of the scholarship recipient's POST certification within 15 days
156	after the day on which POST certifies the scholarship recipient;
157	(b) submit verification of the scholarship recipient's employment to the board within 15
158	days after the day on which the scholarship recipient is employed as a peace officer, including:
159	(i) the employer's name, address, and telephone number;
160	(ii) the date of the scholarship recipient's hiring; and
161	(iii) the scholarship recipient's job title; and
162	(c) notify the board within 15 days after the day on which the employer terminates the
163	scholarship recipient.
164	(7) A scholarship recipient shall repay to the board the full amount of the scholarship
165	award that the scholarship recipient received under the program, including money paid for
166	tuition, fees, and required textbooks, if the scholarship recipient fails to:
167	(a) meet the requirements for POST certification as described in Title 53, Chapter 6,
168	Part 2, Peace Officer Training and Certification Act;
169	(b) work as a peace officer for less than five years after the day on which POST
170	certifies the scholarship recipient; or
171	(c) subject to Subsection (3), earn a degree within four contiguous academic years
172	beginning on the day on which the scholarship recipient enrolls in a post-secondary degree
173	program.
174	(8) (a) The board shall make rules, in accordance with Title 63G, Chapter 3, Utah
175	Administrative Rulemaking Act, to:
176	(i) set deadlines for receiving scholarship applications and supporting documentation;
177	(ii) establish an application process and appeal process for the program;
178	(iii) establish policies and procedures for cancellation or repayment of scholarship
179	awards if the scholarship recipient fails to meet the requirements under this section;
180	(iv) collaborate with POST and other law enforcement and correction agencies to
181	provide high school students information on law enforcement careers; and
182	(v) notify POST when a student receives a scholarship under the program.

183	(b) The board shall include a disclosure on all applications and materials related to the
184	program that the amount of the awarded scholarship may be subject to funding availability or
185	reduction in accordance with Subsection (9).
186	(9) If an appropriation under this section is insufficient to cover the costs associated
187	with the program, the board may:
188	(a) reduce the amount of a scholarship award; and
189	(b) distribute scholarship awards on a pro rata basis to all eligible applicants who
190	submitted a complete application before the application deadline.

192	53B-10-106. Pathways development.
193	(1) The board shall develop and implement a plan that creates clear educational
194	pathways:
195	(a) from a technical college described in Subsection 53B-1-102(1)(b) to an institution;
196	[and]
197	(b) in course work leading to a qualifying [degree] job or a qualifying [job] degree as
198	described in Section 53B-10-203[-]; and
199	(c) for high schools that offer criminal justice or protective services pathways
200	programs, including information on:
201	(i) available concurrent enrollment classes in subjects described in Section
202	53B-8-112.5; and
203	(ii) scholarship opportunities for careers as peace officers as defined in Section
204	<u>53B-8c-102.</u>
205	(2) The plan shall maximize efficiencies in transferring [eared] earned credit and help
206	align academic programs with workforce needs.
207	(3) In accordance with Title 63G, Chapter 3, Utah Administrative Rulemaking Act, the
208	board may make rules necessary to establish a plan described in this section.
