460 (B) place the return envelope in a ballot drop box, designated by the election officer, 461 for the precinct where the voter resides. 462 (2) (a) Except as otherwise provided in Section 20A-16-404, to be valid, a ballot that is mailed must be: 463 464 (i) clearly postmarked on or before election day, or otherwise clearly marked by the 465 post office as received by the post office on or before election day; and 466 (ii) received in the office of the election officer before noon on the day of the official 467 canvass following the election. 468 (b) Except as provided in Subsection (2)(c), to be valid, a ballot shall, before the polls 469 close on election day, be deposited in: 470 (i) a ballot box at a polling place; or 471 (ii) a ballot drop box designated by an election officer for the jurisdiction to which the 472 ballot relates. 473 (c) An election officer may, but is not required to, forward a ballot deposited in a ballot 474 drop box in the wrong jurisdiction to the correct jurisdiction. 475 (d) An election officer shall ensure that a voter who is, at or before 8 p.m., in line at a 476 ballot drop box, with a sealed return envelope containing a ballot in the voter's possession, to 477 deposit the ballot in the ballot drop box. 478 (3) Except as provided in Subsection (4), to vote at a polling place the voter shall, after 479 complying with Subsections (1)(a) through (d): 480 (a) sign the official register or pollbook; and 481 (b) (i) place the ballot in the ballot box; or 482 (ii) if the ballot is a provisional ballot, place the ballot in the provisional ballot 483 envelope, complete the information printed on the provisional ballot envelope, and deposit the 484 provisional ballot envelope in the provisional ballot box. 485 (4) (a) An individual with a disability may vote a mechanical ballot at a polling place. 486 (b) An individual other than an individual with a disability may vote a mechanical 487 ballot at a polling place if permitted by the election officer. 488 (5) To vote a mechanical ballot, the voter shall:

502	(7) A voter who votes at a polling place:
503	(a) shall mark and cast or deposit the ballot without delay and shall leave the voting
504	area after voting; and

506	(i) occupy a voting booth occupied by another, except as provided in Section

508	(ii) remain within the voting area more than 10 minutes; or

521	(a) shall designate at least one ballot drop box in each municipality and reservation

524	(c) shall clearly mark each ballot drop box as an official ballot drop box for the election
525	officer's jurisdiction;
526	(d) shall provide 24-hour video surveillance of each unattended ballot drop box; and
527	(e) shall post a sign on or near each unattended ballot drop box indicating that the
528	ballot drop box is under 24-hour video surveillance.
529	(2) Except as provided in Section 20A-1-308 or Subsection (5), the election officer
