It is my honor and privilege to stand before each of you and every citizen of the great state of Utah to open the 2023 General Session of the 65th State Legislature.

Welcome to the service of the great people of Utah!

I want to thank someone who won't be here for this session. Sen. Karen Mayne. She has been a true champion for her district and the state of Utah. I am lucky to call her a dear friend, and I will miss her wisdom and her wit. She is a great stateswoman.

I have talked many times about how great Utah is. Our economy, upward mobility, how happy we are, and our great quality of life. We are blessed to live in an amazing state where the policies we have implemented have fortified our economy, supported upward mobility, and preserved our quality of life.

A significant contributing factor to why we enjoy such a great state is the moral character of the people who live here – hardworking, honest individuals with integrity and a great work ethic.

Those who have participated in today's ceremony exemplify these qualities. I want to thank each of them. President Randall, Elder Holland, the American Heritage School. Please join me in recognizing them.

I also can't start the session without praising our Senate staff. We have the best team, led by our incredible chief of staff, Mark Thomas. They are always available to help, go the extra mile and consistently exceed my expectations. Thank you to Mark, Aundrea, Brian, Jen, Nikaela, Kennedie, Lori, Lizzy, Paige, Kendly, May, Bennett, and Chad.

The same goes for all our legislative offices—The Office of Legislative Research and General Counsel, The Office of Legislative Fiscal Analysts, The Office of Legislative Auditor and Legislative Services led by our directors John Cannon, Jonathan Ball and Kade Minchey and our new general counsel Victoria Ashby.

Thank you to the Capitol Preservation staff for coordinating the many events and the Utah Highway Patrol for diligently working to keep everyone who works, serves and visits the Capitol safe.

All of you help make the session possible and successful.

On a personal note, we all have people in our lives who personally support us. I want to recognize my wife, Susan, who has always been my better half. Thank you for your understanding, support, strength and love. Join me in recognizing her and all of our loved ones that support and allow us to serve.

Spouses and loved ones stand. We could not do what we do without you.

I also want to recognize Reed Randall, Taylor's Dad. Taylor's dad taught me managerial accounting. I did not like accounting until he showed us how it could be used to make decisions. Professor Randall, you changed my life. Thank you. And thank you for raising a wonderful, talented son.

We all have much to be grateful for as we assemble to serve.

As in past years, at your desk is the Senate coin for this session. This year's coin is struck with the image of James Madison. As many of you know, James Madison served in a variety of positions; as a congressman from Virginia, as Secretary of State and as the fourth President of the United States. But his most lasting legacy may be that as the framer and chief architect of our American Constitution.

However, you may not know that James Madison began his service as a delegate to the Fifth Virginia Convention. He, like us, was a citizen legislator.

The Fifth Virginia Convention was a pivotal event. This meeting was held in Williamsburg in May 1776. Not only was this assembly revolutionary, but this convention had foresight.

Leaders included Thomas Jefferson, Patrick Henry and James Madison. They declared Virginia an independent state and produced its first Constitution! On June 29, the convention approved the first Constitution of Virginia, a functioning republican Constitution before July 4, 1776.

Demonstrated by his many contributions to independence, the creation of our great country and the Constitution, James Madison was truly a man of foresight! Today, we honor and aspire to serve with that same vision.

What we do in this session will not only impact us today but will impact all of our tomorrows. More importantly, it will impact the tomorrows of our children, our grandchildren and even our great-grandchildren. Let us commit now to be a body of foresight!

There are many challenges that face us today that we, as a state, have a responsibility to address. But we know because we have the track record to prove it, that these challenges are best solved at the state level.

The Supreme Court has very clearly and in no uncertain terms established that many of the powers of government rightly belong to the states. We have known this for some time. The work we do in this chamber will demonstrate the wisdom of our forefathers in limiting the powers of the federal government and reserving and retaining for states the ability to govern and solve the challenges we face.

In our Constitution's Bill of Rights—written and advocated for by James Madison—the tenth amendment reads:

“The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.”

Let us honor this foresight by taking this opportunity to solve challenges where they can best be addressed here in the great state of Utah.

Allow me to elaborate on some of these opportunities and how we will address them.

First, let's give thanks for many answered prayers and for the amount of moisture we have received so far this winter. However, Utah has always ranked among the driest states in the nation. Our climate is dry and has always been—our pioneer ancestors knew this, and it was among the first challenges they addressed.

My great and great, great grandfathers settled in Layton at the base of Adams Canyon. The first thing they did was construct the Holmes Creek Reservoir. I doubt many of you know where that is. However, if I described it as just east of the Valley View Golf Course in Layton, maybe Senator Vickers, McCay and Sandall would know.

My grandfathers used wood tools to construct the reservoir. When they filled it with water, the pressure destroyed the work they had just finished. I cannot imagine the heartbreak they felt as they watched their work literally wash away. They did not have track excavators, front-end loaders or D9 cats. They didn't even have metal shovels. But they went back to work and solved their water problem.

Today we continue to face water problems. However, we now have track excavators, front end loaders and D9 cats. We have resources, smart engineers, and the same backbone and drive to fix the problem.

Now it is our turn to plan for the next 100 years. Helping not only our state but the West.

Last year, we allocated almost \$500 million to our state's water infrastructure. This is only a drop in the bucket! We need to create, adopt, and implement a solution for the ages.

We can, and we will fix our water problems. We may need to work with our neighbors as far north as Canada and as far south as Arizona.

We need new innovative ways to conserve water. Solutions like subsurface drip systems, cloud seeding and desalination. These same solutions have worked in other countries, and they can and will work here.

This session, we will have the foresight to find lasting solutions to Utah's and the West's water crisis.

2023 will be the year of the tax cut – again, again, again. Our quality of life is supported by Utah's robust economy.

It is not difficult to remember during the pandemic when Hawaii and New York were thinking of laying off teachers and raising taxes. In Utah, because of our strong economy, we were giving educators bonuses and record funding while simultaneously cutting taxes.

The foresight of years past has enabled our economy to continue to be the envy of the nation. By multiple measures—number one economy, fastest growing GDP, top of the list for economic outlook—Utah is doing well!

But current federal policies have failed. Shutting down oil pipelines and Federal overspending have created inflation. Interest rates have risen dramatically to help curb inflation.

We can't control Washington, but Utah can lead the way by reducing taxes and regulatory roadblocks and we will.

In addition to cutting taxes, Utah has increased education funding at record levels. Students do not learn alone; they need teachers. As a state, it is our obligation to provide the best teachers possible. A recent National Education Association (*NEA*) report detailed that Utah teacher salaries grew by more than 5% from 2012–2022, the second-highest growth in the nation.

Even with all the funding for education, for several reasons, teachers' salaries have not kept up. This year for the second time in the history of the state we need to

directly fund teacher salaries directly to every teacher in addition to significantly increasing the WPU.

But that is not good enough. Parents want choice. They want more control over their children's education. In a recent Dan Jones poll, almost 60% said parents should be allowed to use tax dollars designated for their child's education to send their child to an alternate public or private school. *Only 32% opposed it.* We must provide the option for parents to use their tax dollars to select the best education for their child, whether it is charter, public, private, or home school.

To our state's educators, I want to express my deep appreciation for the significant contribution you make individually to Utah students. My daughter is a third-grade teacher. I know how much work and dedication teachers put in each and every day. Your work in the classroom is remarkable. Among the many attributes of a great teacher is their ability to have the foresight to see a student not as they are today but as what they can and will become in the future. Your efforts and foresight with your students will be the most critical component of our state's future.

Thank you, educators!

As our students grow and enter the Utah job market, they will be participating in what is, for the 15th year in a row, the state with the best economic outlook. This didn't just happen. This happens because we have planned and prepared our state to be in and sustain its strong economic position. This is a direct result of prudent, conservative, forward-looking economic tax policy.

However, with out-of-control spending by the federal government, we are seeing inflation continue to rise to heights we have not seen in over 40 years, and interest rates climb to over 6%. Utah is and has been recognized as a safe harbor in the global economic storm. We are the state best poised to overcome a downturn. We have \$1.5 billion dollars of ongoing tax revenue being spent on one-time projects, resulting in a huge working rainy day fund that no other state has.

So what advantages do we have when we have the strongest economy in the nation? We can cut taxes for the third year in a row and fund education at record levels for the third year in a row, even during a pandemic or with a slowing economy. That is what a strong economy allows us to do – pretty amazing.

Good economies are not made in a session, but they can be destroyed in one. We will not let that happen!

We will cut taxes and return money to the hard-working Utahns who earned it.

We will continue to promote long-term investments that help families and individuals succeed.

We will create an environment where businesses can succeed and reap the rewards of their investments.

We will provide the necessary infrastructure for the wheels of commerce to turn unfettered.

This is the foresight that has and will continue to produce a strong and stable Utah economy.

Energy and infrastructure are the two rails that keep our economy moving forward. We must continue to invest with the future in mind.

It is time we fix FrontRunner. We need to eliminate at-grade crossings so it can go 150 miles an hour instead of 79. We need to double-track the FrontRunner so we can run express trains. It needs electrification. Utah's public transportation needs to be competitive with driving an automobile.

We do not have room in Farmington or at the Point of the Mountain for another freeway. A functional, efficient FrontRunner is the answer.

Energy drives our economy. We can and will make the transition to renewables, but until we do, we need to keep producing oil in the basin and refining oil in North Salt Lake to drive gas prices down. We cannot be beholden to foreign nations for such resources. We have them, we can develop them, and we will make smart, forward-looking decisions that will ensure the viability of energy resources in all forms for the next 100 years and beyond.

One of the most dramatic events coming out of COVID-19 was the effect on the housing market. Home costs soared, both for purchase and for rent. Inventories are at all-time lows, and prices at all-time highs.

I am personally concerned we are losing our middle class. More and more people are renting instead of buying. We must find a way to get more people out of apartments and into their first home. It is time to bring back state assistance financing for first-time home buyers. We need to help individuals just starting out build equity for their future, have the opportunity for greater upward mobility, and experience the pride of home ownership.

At the onset, I said we faced many challenges, and I have enumerated a few. There are many more, which we will tackle in the next 45 days.

I need to change my own words and say that we don't have challenges but that we have opportunities!

Ours is the responsibility—through our joint commitment to foresight, deliberation, and hard work—to transform these challenges into opportunities.

We have the opportunity to improve and empower all Utahns to even greater heights.

We have the opportunity to lay the foundations for success for generations to come.

I serve—and I believe many of you share this motivation—not for self but to make Utah even better for my children and grandchildren. To make Utah a place that they can choose to call home.

The title “Founder of the Constitution” was not given to James Madison by history or those who came later, but by his peers, those with whom he served. In his later years, when this title was referenced in his company, Madison protested that the Constitution was not “the off-spring of a single brain” but “the work of many heads and many hands.”

That is what we need, “the work of many heads and many hands.”

Our opportunities—are great! But they are not greater than those assembled here.

Let us, with “the work of many heads and many hands,” engage in debate with foresight, make decisions that will positively impact generations, and serve the deserving people of Utah—those here now and the generations which will follow—to the best of our collective abilities.

It is my prayer that God's most tender care be upon the United States of America, and may his choicest blessings be upon all of the people of our great state of Utah. Thank you!
