2324	Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:
25	Section 1. Section 53-6-106 is amended to read:
26	53-6-106. Creation of Peace Officer Standards and Training Council Purpose
27	Membership Quorum Meetings Compensation.



28	(1) There is created the Peace Officer Standards and Training Council.
29	(2) The council shall serve as an advisory board to the director of the division on
30	matters relating to peace officer and dispatcher standards and training.
31	(3) The council includes:
32	(a) the attorney general or a designated representative;
33	(b) the superintendent of the highway patrol or a designated representative;
34	(c) the executive director of the Department of Corrections or a designated
35	representative; and
36	(d) 14 additional members appointed by the governor having qualifications,
37	experience, or education in the field of law enforcement as follows:
38	(i) one incumbent mayor;
39	(ii) one incumbent county commissioner;
40	(iii) three incumbent sheriffs, one of whom is a representative of the Utah Sheriffs
41	Association, one of whom is from a county having a population of 100,000 or more, and one of
42	whom is from a county having a population of less than 100,000;
43	(iv) three incumbent police chiefs, one of whom is a representative of the Utah Chiefs
44	of Police Association, one of whom is from a city of the first or second class, and one of whom
45	is from a city of the third, fourth, or fifth class or town;
46	(v) one representative of the Fraternal Order of Police;
47	[(v)] (vi) one representative of the Utah Peace Officers Association;
48	[(vi)] (vii) one educator in the field of public administration, criminal justice, or a
49	related area;
50	[(viii)] (viii) one current Utah certified law enforcement officer, employed in a
51	non-supervisory role, rotated every term; and
52	[(viii)] (ix) three [persons] individuals selected at large by the governor.
53	(4) (a) Except as required by Subsection (4)(b), the 14 members of the council shall be
54	appointed by the governor for four-year terms.
55	(b) Notwithstanding the requirements of Subsection (4)(a), the governor shall, at the
56	time of appointment or reappointment, adjust the length of terms to ensure that the terms of
57	council members are staggered so that approximately half of the council is appointed every two
58	years.

Section 2. Effective date.

This bill takes effect on May 1, 2024.

59	(c) A member may be reappointed for additional terms.
60	(d) When a vacancy occurs in the membership for any reason, the replacement shall be
61	appointed for the unexpired term by the governor from the same category in which the vacancy
62	occurs.
63	(5) A member of the council ceases to be a member:
64	(a) immediately upon the termination of the member's holding the office or
65	employment that was the basis for eligibility to membership on the council; or
66	(b) upon two unexcused absences in one year from regularly scheduled council
67	meetings.
68	(6) The council shall select a chair and vice chair from among its members.
69	(7) Ten members of the advisory council constitute a quorum.
70	(8) (a) Meetings may be called by the chair, the commissioner, or the director and shall
71	be called by the chair upon the written request of nine members.
72	(b) Meetings shall be held at the times and places determined by the director.
73	(9) The council shall meet at least two times per year.
74	(10) A member may not receive compensation or benefits for the member's service, but
75	may receive per diem and travel expenses in accordance with:
76	(a) Section 63A-3-106;
77	(b) Section 63A-3-107; and
78	(c) rules made by the Division of Finance pursuant to Sections 63A-3-106 and
79	63A-3-107.
80	(11) Membership on the council does not disqualify any member from holding any
81	other public office or employment.
