Weiler 5 6 7 LONG TITLE 8 **General Description:** 9 This bill requires a school traffic safety committee to include recommendations for 10 infrastructure improvements in a child access routing plan. **Highlighted Provisions:** 11 12 This bill: 13 ► defines terms: 14 requires a school traffic safety committee to: 15 • submit a child access routing plan to the Department of Transportation and 16 municipal and county highway authorities; and include priority recommendations for infrastructure improvements in a child 17 • 18 access routing plan; 19 requires a highway authority to provide feedback on: 20 • the estimated time and cost to complete infrastructure improvements that a 21 school traffic safety committee recommends; and 22 • infrastructure improvements the highway authority has prioritized for the 23 following year; 24 requires school traffic safety committees to make recommendations to the State 25 Board of Education and the Transportation Advisory Committee for new approved 26 bus routes: and 27 makes technical and conforming changes.

37	Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:
38	Section 1. Section <b>53G-4-402</b> is amended to read:
39	53G-4-402. Powers and duties generally.
40	(1) A local school board shall:
41	(a) implement the core standards for Utah public schools using instructional materials
42	that best correlate to the core standards for Utah public schools and graduation requirements;
43	(b) administer tests, required by the state board, which measure the progress of each
44	student, and coordinate with the state superintendent and state board to assess results and create
45	plans to improve the student's progress, which shall be submitted to the state board for
46	approval;
47	(c) use progress-based assessments as part of a plan to identify schools, teachers, and
48	students that need remediation and determine the type and amount of federal, state, and local
49	resources to implement remediation;
50	(d) for each grading period and for each course in which a student is enrolled, issue a
51	grade or performance report to the student:
52	(i) that reflects the student's work, including the student's progress based on mastery,
53	for the grading period; and
54	(ii) in accordance with the local school board's adopted grading or performance
55	standards and criteria;
56	(e) develop early warning systems for students or classes failing to make progress;
57	(f) work with the state board to establish a library of documented best practices,
58	consistent with state and federal regulations, for use by the special districts;

59	(g) implement training programs for school administrators, including basic
60	management training, best practices in instructional methods, budget training, staff
61	management, managing for learning results and continuous improvement, and how to help
62	every child achieve optimal learning in basic academic subjects; and
63	(h) ensure that the local school board meets the data collection and reporting standards
64	described in Section 53E-3-501.
65	(2) Local school boards shall spend Minimum School Program funds for programs and
66	activities for which the state board has established minimum standards or rules under Section
67	53E-3-501.
68	(3) (a) A local school board may purchase, sell, and make improvements on school
69	sites, buildings, and equipment, and construct, erect, and furnish school buildings.
70	(b) School sites or buildings may only be conveyed or sold on local school board
71	resolution affirmed by at least two-thirds of the school board members.
72	(4) (a) A local school board may participate in the joint construction or operation of a
73	school attended by students residing within the district and students residing in other districts
74	either within or outside the state.
75	(b) Any agreement for the joint operation or construction of a school shall:
76	(i) be signed by the president of the local school board of each participating district;
77	(ii) include a mutually agreed upon pro rata cost; and
78	(iii) be filed with the state board.
79	(5) A local school board may establish, locate, and maintain elementary, secondary,
80	and applied technology schools.
81	(6) A local school board may enter into cooperative agreements with other local school
82	boards to provide educational services that best utilize resources for the overall operation of the
83	school districts, including shared transportation services.
84	(7) An agreement under Subsection (6) shall:
85	(a) be signed by the president of the local school board of each participating district;
86	(b) specify the resource being shared;
87	(c) include a mutually agreed upon pro rata cost;
88	(d) include the duration of the agreement; and
89	(e) be filed with the state board.

90	(8) Except as provided in Section 53E-3-905, a local school board may enroll children
91	in school who are at least five years old before September 2 of the year in which admission is
92	sought.
93	(9) A local school board:
94	(a) may establish and support school libraries; and
95	(b) shall provide an online platform:
96	(i) through which a parent is able to view the title, author, and a description of any
97	material the parent's child borrows from the school library, including a history of borrowed
98	materials, either using an existing online platform that the LEA uses or through a separate
99	platform; and
100	(ii) (A) for a school district with 1,000 or more enrolled students, no later than August
101	1, 2024; and
102	(B) for a school district with fewer than 1,000 enrolled students, no later than August
103	1, 2026.
104	(10) A local school board may collect damages for the loss, injury, or destruction of
105	school property.
106	(11) A local school board may authorize guidance and counseling services for students
107	and the student's parents before, during, or following school enrollment.
108	(12) (a) A local school board shall administer and implement federal educational
109	programs in accordance with Title 53E, Chapter 3, Part 8, Implementing Federal or National
110	Education Programs.
111	(b) Federal funds are not considered funds within the school district budget under
112	Chapter 7, Part 3, Budgets.
113	(13) (a) A local school board may organize school safety patrols and adopt policies
114	under which the patrols promote student safety.
115	(b) A student appointed to a safety patrol shall be at least 10 years old and have written
116	parental consent for the appointment.
117	(c) Safety patrol members may not direct vehicular traffic or be stationed in a portion
118	of a highway intended for vehicular traffic use.
119	(d) Liability may not attach to a school district, its employees, officers, or agents, or to
120	a safety patrol member, a parent of a safety patrol member, or an authorized volunteer assisting

121	the program by virtue of the organization, maintenance, or operation of a school safety patrol.
122	(14) (a) A local school board may on its own behalf, or on behalf of an educational
123	institution for which the local school board is the direct governing body, accept private grants,
124	loans, gifts, endowments, devises, or bequests that are made for educational purposes.
125	(b) The contributions made under Subsection (14)(a) are not subject to appropriation
126	by the Legislature.
127	(15) (a) A local school board may appoint and fix the compensation of a compliance
128	officer to issue citations for violations of Subsection 76-10-105(2)(b).
129	(b) A person may not be appointed to serve as a compliance officer without the
130	person's consent.
131	(c) A teacher or student may not be appointed as a compliance officer.
132	(16) A local school board shall adopt bylaws and policies for the local school board's
133	own procedures.
134	(17) (a) A local school board shall make and enforce policies necessary for the control
135	and management of the district schools.
136	(b) Local school board policies shall be in writing, filed, and referenced for public
137	access.
138	(18) A local school board may hold school on legal holidays other than Sundays.
139	(19) (a) As used in this Subsection (19):
140	(i) "Committee" means the school traffic safety committee established in Subsection
141	<u>(19)(b).</u>
142	(ii) "Highway" means the same as that term is defined in Section 72-1-102.
143	(iii) "Highway authority" means the same as that term is defined in Section 72-1-102.
144	[(a)] (b) A local school board shall establish for each school year a school traffic safety
145	committee to implement this Subsection (19).
146	[(b)] (c) The committee shall be composed of one representative of:
147	(i) the schools within the district;
148	(ii) the Parent Teachers' Association of the schools within the district;
149	(iii) the municipality or county;
150	(iv) state or local law enforcement; and
151	(v) state or local traffic safety engineering.

152	[ <del>(c)</del> ] <u>(d)</u> The committee shall:
153	(i) receive suggestions from school community councils, parents, teachers, and others,
154	and recommend school traffic safety improvements, boundary changes to enhance safety, and
155	school traffic safety program measures;
156	(ii) review and submit annually to the Department of Transportation and affected
157	municipalities and counties a child access routing plan for each elementary, middle, and junior
158	high school within the district;
159	(iii) consult the Utah Safety Council and the Division of Family Health Services and
160	provide training to all students in kindergarten through grade 6, within the district, on school
161	crossing safety and use; and
162	(iv) help ensure the district's compliance with rules made by the Department of
163	Transportation under Section 41-6a-303.
164	(e) (i) The committee shall, for each elementary, middle, and junior high school within
165	the district:
166	(A) annually submit a child access routing plan to the Department of Transportation
167	and the municipal or county highway authority that governs each highway included in the child
168	access routing plan; and
169	(B) ensure that the child access routing plan complies with Subsection (19)(e)(ii).
170	(ii) The committee shall ensure that the child access routing plan described in
171	Subsection (19)(e)(i):
172	(A) includes priority recommendations for improvements to enhance safety, including
173	the recommendations received by the committee under Subsection (19)(d)(i); and
174	(B) considers the criteria and specifications established by Department of
175	Transportation rule made under Subsection 41-6a-303(6).
176	(iii) A municipal or county highway authority shall:
177	(A) evaluate the recommendations for improvements in the child access routing plan;
178	and
179	(B) within 60 calendar days after the day on which the committee submits the child
180	access routing plan, provide feedback to the committee on the improvements recommended in
181	the child access routing plan, including the improvements the municipal or county highway
182	authority has prioritized for the following year and the actions the municipal or county highway

183	authority will take to mitigate risks and improve safety in relation to the child access routing
184	<u>plan.</u>
185	(iv) The Department of Transportation may review a child access routing plan as
186	resources allow and provide feedback to the committee on recommended improvements.
187	(v) Nothing in this Subsection (19)(e) requires a municipality or a county highway
188	authority to implement a recommendation that the committee makes and submits in a child
189	access routing plan.
190	(f) The committee shall make recommendations, as necessary, to the local governing
191	board for the local governing board's consideration and discretionary referral to the state board
192	and the Transportation Advisory Committee described in Section 53F-2-403, to approve new
193	bus routes.
194	[(d)] (g) The committee may establish subcommittees as needed to assist in
195	accomplishing the committee's duties under [Subsection (19)(c)] Subsections (19)(d), (e), and
196	<u>(f)</u> .
197	(20) (a) A local school board shall adopt and implement a comprehensive emergency
198	response plan to prevent and combat violence in the local school board's public schools, on
199	school grounds, on its school vehicles, and in connection with school-related activities or
200	events.
201	(b) The plan shall:
202	(i) include prevention, intervention, and response components;
203	(ii) be consistent with the student conduct and discipline policies required for school
204	districts under Chapter 11, Part 2, Miscellaneous Requirements;
205	(iii) require professional learning for all district and school building staff on the staff's
206	roles in the emergency response plan;
207	(iv) provide for coordination with local law enforcement and other public safety
208	representatives in preventing, intervening, and responding to violence in the areas and activities
209	referred to in Subsection (20)(a); and
210	(v) include procedures to notify a student who is off campus at the time of a school
211	violence emergency because the student is:
212	(A) participating in a school-related activity; or
213	(B) excused from school for a period of time during the regular school day to

214	participate in religious instruction at the request of the student's parent.
215	(c) The state board, through the state superintendent, shall develop comprehensive
216	emergency response plan models that local school boards may use, where appropriate, to
217	comply with Subsection (20)(a).
218	(d) A local school board shall, by July 1 of each year, certify to the state board that its
219	plan has been practiced at the school level and presented to and reviewed by its teachers,
220	administrators, students, and the student's parents and local law enforcement and public safety
221	representatives.
222	(21) (a) A local school board may adopt an emergency response plan for the treatment
223	of sports-related injuries that occur during school sports practices and events.
224	(b) The plan may be implemented by each secondary school in the district that has a
225	sports program for students.
226	(c) The plan may:
227	(i) include emergency personnel, emergency communication, and emergency
228	equipment components;
229	(ii) require professional learning on the emergency response plan for school personnel
230	who are involved in sports programs in the district's secondary schools; and
231	(iii) provide for coordination with individuals and agency representatives who:
232	(A) are not employees of the school district; and
233	(B) would be involved in providing emergency services to students injured while
234	participating in sports events.
235	(d) The local school board, in collaboration with the schools referred to in Subsection
236	(21)(b), may review the plan each year and make revisions when required to improve or
237	enhance the plan.
238	(e) The state board, through the state superintendent, shall provide local school boards
239	with an emergency plan response model that local school boards may use to comply with the
240	requirements of this Subsection (21).
241	(22) A local school board shall do all other things necessary for the maintenance,
242	prosperity, and success of the schools and the promotion of education.
243	(23) (a) Before closing a school or changing the boundaries of a school, a local school
244	board shall:

245	(i) at least 90 days before approving the school closure or school boundary change,
246	provide notice that the local school board is considering the closure or boundary change to:
247	(A) parents of students enrolled in the school, using the same form of communication
248	the local school board regularly uses to communicate with parents;
249	(B) parents of students enrolled in other schools within the school district that may be
250	affected by the closure or boundary change, using the same form of communication the local
251	school board regularly uses to communicate with parents; and
252	(C) the governing council and the mayor of the municipality in which the school is
253	located;
254	(ii) provide an opportunity for public comment on the proposed school closure or
255	school boundary change during at least two public local school board meetings; and
256	(iii) hold a public hearing as defined in Section 10-9a-103 and provide public notice of
257	the public hearing as described in Subsection (23)(b).
258	(b) The notice of a public hearing required under Subsection (23)(a)(iii) shall:
259	(i) indicate the:
260	(A) school or schools under consideration for closure or boundary change; and
261	(B) the date, time, and location of the public hearing;
262	(ii) for at least 10 days before the day of the public hearing, be published for the school
263	district in which the school is located, as a class A notice under Section 63G-30-102; and
264	(iii) at least $[3\theta]$ <u>60</u> days before the public hearing described in Subsection (23)(a)(iii),
265	be provided as described in Subsections (23)(a)(i).
266	(24) A local school board may implement a facility energy efficiency program
267	established under Title 11, Chapter 44, Performance Efficiency Act.
268	(25) A local school board may establish or partner with a certified youth court in
269	accordance with Section 80-6-902 or establish or partner with a comparable restorative justice
270	program, in coordination with schools in that district. A school may refer a student to a youth
271	court or a comparable restorative justice program in accordance with Section 53G-8-211.
272	(26) (a) As used in this Subsection (26):
273	(i) "Learning material" means any learning material or resource used to deliver or
274	support a student's learning, including textbooks, reading materials, videos, digital materials,
275	websites, and other online applications.

276 (ii) (A) "Instructional material" means learning material that a local school board 277 adopts and approves for use within the LEA. 278 (B) "Instructional material" does not include learning material used in a concurrent 279 enrollment, advanced placement, or international baccalaureate program or class or another 280 class with required instructional material that is not subject to selection by the local school 281 board. 282 (iii) "Supplemental material" means learning material that: 283 (A) an educator selects for classroom use: and 284 (B) a local school board has not considered and adopted, approved, or prohibited for 285 classroom use within the LEA. 286 (b) A local school board shall: 287 (i) make instructional material that the school district uses readily accessible and 288 available for a parent to view: 289 (ii) annually notify a parent of a student enrolled in the school district of how to access 290 the information described in Subsection (26)(b)(i); and 291 (iii) include on the school district's website information about how to access the 292 information described in Subsection (26)(b)(i). 293 (c) In selecting and approving instructional materials for use in the classroom, a local 294 school board shall: 295 (i) establish an open process, involving educators and parents of students enrolled in 296 the LEA, to review and recommend instructional materials for board approval; and 297 (ii) ensure that under the process described in Subsection (26)(c)(i), the board: 298 (A) before the meetings described in Subsection (26)(c)(ii)(B), posts the recommended 299 learning material online to allow for public review or, for copyrighted material, makes the 300 recommended learning material available at the LEA for public review; 301 (B) before adopting or approving the recommended instructional materials, holds at 302 least two public meetings on the recommendation that provides an opportunity for educators 303 whom the LEA employs and parents of students enrolled in the LEA to express views and 304 opinions on the recommendation; and 305 (C) adopts or approves the recommended instructional materials in an open and regular 306 board meeting.

307 (d) A local school board shall adopt a supplemental materials policy that provides
308 flexible guidance to educators on the selection of supplemental materials or resources that an
309 educator reviews and selects for classroom use using the educator's professional judgment,
310 including whether any process or permission is required before classroom use of the materials
311 or resources.

(e) If an LEA contracts with another party to provide online or digital materials, the
LEA shall include in the contract a requirement that the provider give notice to the LEA any
time that the provider makes a material change to the content of the online or digital materials,
excluding regular informational updates on current events.

- (f) Nothing in this Subsection (26) requires a local school board to review all learningmaterials used within the LEA.

- 319 This bill takes effect on May 1, 2024.
