28	Section 1. Section 47-3-304 is amended to read:
29	47-3-304. Fees.
30	(1) As used in this section:
31	(a) "Military service member" means the same as that term is defined in Section
32	<u>53B-8-102.</u>
33	(b) "Peace officer" means an officer described in Section 53-13-102.
34	(c) "Retired peace officer" means a peace officer who has become eligible, applies for,
35	and may receive an allowance under Title 49, Utah State
36	Retirement and Insurance Benefit Act.
37	(d) "Veteran" means the same as that term is defined in Section 68-3-12.5.
38	(2) Reasonable fees for the use of a shooting range to cover the incidental material and
39	supply costs incurred by making the range available to a group, may be established by:
40	(a) the State Armory Board established under Title 39A, Chapter 2, State
41	Armory Board, for a military range; and
42	(b) for a nonmilitary range, the state agency, institution of higher education, or political
43	subdivision that operates or has control of the range.
44	[(2)] (3) Fees for nonmilitary shooting range use may not exceed fees charged by the
45	Department of Natural Resources for the same or similar activity.
46	(4) (a) Fees established under Subsection (2) are waived for military service members,
47	peace officers, retired peace officers, and veterans at state-owned public shooting ranges.
48	(b) Notwithstanding Subsection 47-3-305(1)(b), fees are waived for military service
49	members, peace officers, retired peace officers, and veterans at shooting ranges that are
50	operated as a public shooting range staffed and operated by the Division of Wildlife Resources.
51	(c) Waived fees under this Subsection (4) do not include materials such as clay pigeons
52	or special targets.
53	$[\frac{(3)}{2}]$ Fees collected under Subsection $[\frac{(1)}{2}]$ shall be:
54	(a) for a shooting range operated or controlled by a state agency or an institution of
55	higher education, deposited [in] into the General Fund as dedicated credits to be used for the
56	operation and maintenance of the range; and
57	(b) for a shooting range operated or controlled by a political subdivision, deposited in
58	the political subdivision's general fund.

59	Section 2. Section 47-3-305 is amended to read:
60	47-3-305. Exceptions and prohibitions.
61	(1) This part does not apply to:
62	(a) shooting ranges that are otherwise open to the public;
63	(b) shooting ranges that are operated as a public shooting range staffed by and operated
64	by Division of Wildlife Resources;
65	(c) the Utah National Guard ranges located at Camp Williams and the Salt Lake
66	International Airport;
67	(d) Department of Corrections ranges;
68	(e) Department of Public Safety ranges; and
69	[(e)] (f) ranges owned, operated, or currently leased as of March 26, 2013, by a state or
70	local public safety agency.
71	(2) (a) Firearms may not be allowed in a school building, except under the provision of
72	Section 76-10-505.5, unless there is an outdoor entrance to the shooting range and the most
73	direct access to the range is used.
74	(b) An outdoor entrance to a shooting range may not be blocked by fences, structures,
75	or gates for the purpose of blocking the outdoor entrance.
76	(3) (a) Only air guns may be used in public ranges [where] in which the ventilation
77	systems do not meet current OSHA standards as applied to the duration of exposure of the
78	participants.
79	(b) For the purposes of this part, an air gun does not include a larger caliber pneumatic
80	[weapons] weapon, paintball [guns] gun, or air [shotguns] shotgun.
81	(4) Group range use is a lawful, approved activity under Subsection 76-10-505.5(4)(a).
