LONG TITLE

General Description:

This bill enacts provisions related to child and maternal health services.

- requires the department to inform individuals about child and maternal health services offered by state agencies; and
- allows a state agency to share an individual's information to facilitate access to child and maternal health services if certain circumstances are met.

26B-7-122, Utah Code Annotated 1953

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:

Section 1. Section **26B-7-122** is enacted to read:

26B-7-122. { Child and maternal} Maternal and child health services --

Information sharing within state agencies.

(1) As used in this section:

(a) "Evidence-based early childhood home visiting services" means early childhood services delivered using a service delivery model that meets the United States Department of Health and Human Services criteria for an evidence-based early childhood home visiting service delivery model.

(b) "Recipient" means an individual { who receives child health services or maternal health services}, or {a}the individual's parent if the individual is a minor, {from the department that is directly or indirectly provided by the department} who receives services from the Division of Family Health, including evidence-based early childhood home visiting services.

(c) "Universal consent form" means a form described in Subsection (4).

(2) The department shall ensure that a recipient is informed of any services offered by a state agency that the recipient may be eligible {for, including evidence-based early childhood home visiting services offered by the Division of Family Health} to receive.

(3) Subject to appropriation, the department shall develop a process that will allow the department to follow up directly or indirectly with a recipient to determine the degree to which the recipient's needs have been addressed by services provided by the department.

(4) (a) The department shall develop a universal consent form that complies with all relevant state and federal laws regarding information sharing for the facilitation of {child health services and }maternal and child health services.

(b) An individual may complete the universal consent form to authorize a state agency to share the individual's information with another state agency in order to facilitate providing {child health services or }maternal and child health services.

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(c) An individual may:

(i) limit which state agencies receive the individual's information; and

(ii) revoke the individual's consent for sharing the information at any time.

(d) A state agency, including a local education agency, shall:

(i) accept the form if the state agency offers {child health services or }maternal and child health services; and

(ii) share the individual's information with another state agency that offers {child health services or }maternal and child health services in accordance with the individual's direction.

Section 2. Effective date.

This bill takes effect on May 1, 2024.
